A BILL

for

- 1 AN ACT relating to mines and minerals; amending the
- 2 quarterly meeting requirement for the state mining council;
- 3 modifying mine foremen provisions; repealing references to
- 4 unit foreman; repealing certain exemptions for mines
- 5 exploying five or less persons; eliminating unnecessary and
- 6 outdated language; and providing for an effective date.

8 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

- 10 **Section 1.** W.S. 30-2-101(a)(ix), 30-2-303, 30-2-308,
- 11 30-2-309(a) (intro), (b) (intro) and (d), 30-2-312, 30-2-402,
- 30-3-106(n), and 30-3-112(f) and (h) are amended to read:

14 **30-2-101.** Definitions.

15

16 (a) As used in this act:

(ix) "Mine foreman" means the person whom the

operator places in charge of the workings of a mine or a

portion of a mine and of persons employed therein. He is

the official responsible for the health and safety of the

employees;

8 (xiv) "Unit foreman" means a company employed
9 supervisor having the same responsibility in the workings
10 under his supervision as the mine foreman has in the whole
11 mine regarding this act;

30-2-303. Regular and special meetings of mining council; record of proceedings.

Regular meetings of the council shall be quarter-annually in the months of February, May, August and November quarterly at a place within this state determined by the council. Special meetings may be called at any time by the governor, by the president of the council or by the inspector of mines and shall be called upon the request of any three (3) council members. Full and complete minutes and records of all council meetings, proceedings and actions shall be kept and preserved.

Mining Council Comments.

Changing the language to state that the Council shall meet quarterly, rather than dictating the actual months that they must meet, will give the Council more flexibility in their personal schedules and more operational latitude. The Council is not proposing fewer meetings.

30-2-308. Mine foremen; when required; duties; mines to

8 be supervised by certified personnel.

9

Each underground mine regularly employing 10 11 persons with one (1) or more persons present underground shall be supervised by a certified mine foreman who shall 12 ensure compliance with mining laws regarding his duties and 13 14 the health and safety of mine employees. If the mine foreman is unable personally to perform his duties required 15 16 by law because of the extent of mining operations, the 17 operator shall employ a sufficient number of certified unit 18 foremen who shall act under the direction of the mine 19 foreman. A certified mine foreman shall remain underground 20 in the general working areas of the mine when persons are 21 present underground. The mine or unit foreman shall not 22 permit any person to work in an unsafe place unless it be 23 for the purpose of making it safe. Work for the purpose of making a place safe shall be under the direct supervision 24 25 of a certified official mine foreman. The mine foreman shall provide data and information regarding the operation 26

mined. Except

1 of the mine required by the inspector. on forms 2 by the inspector. 3 **Mineral Council Comments.** Eliminate the language that refers to "unit foreman". This is an antiquated term in 4 today's mines. The mine foreman is actually, in many cases, a front line supervisor. 5 The current statute seems to say that the mine foreman is the highest person of 6 authority at the mine and all other persons are unit foremen. In today's mines there 7 are Mine Managers, Mine Superintendents and General Mine Foreman who 8 outrank the Mine Foreman. 9 10 11 Eliminate the language that refers to mines employing less than five (5) persons and add language that refers to one (1) or more persons present. There are no 12 underground mines in Wyoming today with less than five (5) persons. Further, the 13 14 Council believes that, due to the hazardous nature of the work, all persons who work underground should be supervised by a certified mine foreman. 15 16 17 Add new language that a certified mine foreman shall remain underground in the general working areas of the mine when persons are present underground. The 18 Council believes that a certified mine foreman should be readily available, in the 19 mine, in case of an emergency. 20 21 The Council believes that "certified official" should be changed to read "mine 22 foreman". There are several other types of certifications, that are issued by the 23 Council and the State Mine Inspector, that could allow a person to be defined as a 24 certified official. These certifications are Mine Examiner, Mine Shot-firer and Mine 25 Electrician. 26 27 Eliminate the language that referring to forms furnished by the inspector. The 28 State Mine Inspector does not provide forms to mine foremen. 29 30 31 30-2-309. Mine foreman and mine examiner 32 qualifications; certificates; certificate required; 33 reciprocity; council duties. 34 35 No person shall act as mine foreman, unit foreman or safety engineer at any underground mine unless he holds 36 37 a mine foreman certificate for the type of mineral being

6 (b) No person shall act as a mine examiner in any 7 underground mine unless he holds a mine examiner 8 certificate for the type of mineral being mined. Except as provided in subsection (f) of this section, to To obtain a 9 10 mine examiner certificate for a particular mineral an applicant shall pass the required examination for the 11

15 Any person holding a certificate of competency (d) 16 from a proper examining board of any state with which Wyoming has a reciprocal agreement may perform the duties 17 in Wyoming for which his certificate certifies that he is 18 19 competent, without examination by the state mining council. 20 Before assuming any duties in a mine, the person shall 21 present his certificate to the council through the 22 inspector and secure approval of the certificate by the 23 council. The person is subject to examination by the 24 council at the request of the inspector. The person's

1 authority to act in Wyoming as mine foreman, mine examiner, or safety engineer or unit foreman may be cancelled in the 2 3 same manner as certificates issued by the council. No 4 person shall employ any mine foreman, mine examiner, or

5 safety engineer or unit foreman in an underground mine who

does not possess the certificate of competency required. 6

(f) Any person holding a certificate as an underground coal mine examiner as of June 30, 1994, who has worked as a mine examiner in this state, shall subject to the examination requirements of subsection (b) of this section. Any person holding a certificate as an underground coal mine foreman as of June 30, 1994, who has worked as a mine foreman in this state, shall not be subject to the examination requirements of subsection (a) of this section. Notwithstanding the requirements of subsections (a) and (b) of this section regarding practical experience for a particular type of mineral, the state mining council shall issue trona mine examiner or trona mine foreman certificates to persons who held underground coal mine examiner or mine foreman certificates, respectively, as of June 30, 1994, and who have worked as a mine examiner or mine foreman in this state.

Mining Council Comments.

The statute was enacted to correct a problem that was created during the 1993 Session when a change in the statutes required a person to be certified in the type of mineral in which he wished to act as a Mine Foreman or Mine Examiner.

Prior to 1993 a person could act as a Mine Foreman or Examiner in a trona mine with an Underground Coal Mine Foreman or Examiner certification. This practice originated with the inception of underground trona mining. The trona industry was a new industry and there were no certified Trona Mine Foremen or Mine Examiners available. The Council, at that time, elected to allow a person who was certified as a Underground Coal Mine Foreman or Mine Examiner, to act as a mine foreman or mine examiner in an underground trona mine.

The statute was changed in 1993 due to problems involving the statutory language. The statute, at that time, addressed who could act as a foreman or examiner but did not address who could take the test. There were several serious problems with unqualified persons applying to take the test. The legal opinion at the time was that the Council could not prevent those persons from taking the test.

The 1993 statute change inadvertently caused several persons, who were working as Mine Foremen and Mine Examiners in a trona mine, who had underground coal Mine Foreman or Mine Examiner certifications, to lose their job until they could take the test to re-certify as underground Trona Foreman or Examiners.

The Council feels that there is enough difference in the mining techniques, mining statutes and rules for these two minerals that a separate certification for underground coal and underground trona has been developed.

The Council transferred 63 certificates during the first two years or so. Council has not transferred a certificate since the RAG, Shoshone # One Mine, in Hanna, shut down two years ago. There are no operating underground coal mines from which a person could transfer to a trona mine.

30-2-312. Optional certifications of surface mine foremen and mine examiners; surface mine operators not required to employ.

mining council may certify a state (a) foreman, unit foreman, safety engineer or mine examiner 39 desiring to work in a surface mine upon request by an

- 1 applicant for the certificate. Certificates shall be issued
- 2 under W.S. 30-2-307 and 30-2-309(a) through (d). Applicants
- 3 and certificate holders are subject to W.S. 30-2-310 and
- 4 30-2-311.

- 6 (b) No owner or operator of a surface mine is
- 7 required to employ a certified mine foreman, unit foreman,
- 8 safety engineer or mine examiner.

12 30-2-402. Annual report to inspector; contents.

- 14 The owner or operator of any mining operation employing
- 15 five (5) or more persons, shall report annually to the
- 16 inspector before January 31 of each year. The report shall
- 17 contain the names of the owners and operators, the post
- 18 office address, the name of the claim to be operated, the
- 19 number of persons employed, classified as to occupation,
- 20 the name of the county mining district, and the tonnage
- 21 produced during the previous calendar year, upon forms
- 22 furnished by the inspector.

- **Mining Council Comments.**
- 24 The Council feels that all operators should be required to file information with the
- 25 State Mine Inspector for his annual report to the Governor. Presently there are
- 26 small operators that file the information voluntarily.

30-3-106. Permissible methane detector required;

(n) A certified mine foreman immediately directing the activities of the area subject to the report shall read and countersign the record book of the mine examiner daily.

and read and countersign the daily and weekly reports of unit foremen. Any dangerous conditions disclosed in the reports shall be corrected promptly.

30-3-112. Roofs of mines; minimum standards;
15 supports; inspection.

17 (f) The mine foreman, unit foreman and mine 18 inspectors shall ascertain if employees understand roof, 19 rib and face testing. Uninformed and new employees shall be 20 instructed properly in correct methods of testing.

22 (h) At least once each day, the mine foreman or a
23 unit foreman shall examine roof, ribs, and face of working
24 places and passageways, where men work or travel, for

conditions shall be corrected promptly.

Section 2. W.S. 30-2-101(a)(xiv) and 30-2-309(f) are

repealed.

Section 3. Nothing in this act affects the validity

of certificates previously issued pursuant to W.S. 30-2-

309(f).

Section 4. This act is effective July 1, 2003.
