## A Bill

for

1 A JOINT RESOLUTION recognizing breastfeeding's value to the

2 state and its citizens.

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4 WHEREAS, the World Health Organization and UNICEF seek to

5 increase the incidence and duration of breastfeeding

6 globally, as set forth in the Innocenti Declaration on the

7 Protection, Promotion and Support of Breastfeeding, adopted

8 in 1990 by thirty-two (32) governments and ten (10) United

9 Nations agencies, which states, "As a global goal for

10 optimal maternal and child health and nutrition, all women

11 should be enabled to practice exclusive breastfeeding and

12 all infants should be fed exclusively on breast milk from

13 birth to four (4) to six (6) months of age. Thereafter,

14 children should continue to be breastfed while receiving

15 appropriate and adequate complementary foods for up to two

16 (2) years of age or beyond. This child feeding ideal is to

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- 1 be achieved by creating an appropriate environment of
- 2 awareness and support so that women can breastfeed in this
- 3 manner. . ."; and

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- 5 WHEREAS, the American Academy of Pediatrics issued a policy
- 6 statement in 1997 saying, "Extensive research, especially
- 7 in recent years, documents diverse and compelling
- 8 advantages to infants, mothers, families, and society from
- 9 breastfeeding and the use of human milk for infant feeding.
- 10 These include health, nutritional, immunological,
- 11 developmental, psychological, social, economic, and
- 12 environmental benefits"; and

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- 14 WHEREAS, breastfeeding provides significant health benefits
- 15 to the mother as well. Breastfeeding provides maternal
- 16 protection from breast cancer, osteoporosis, urinary tract
- 17 infections and other cancers. A survey of previous research
- 18 indicates the incidence of breast cancer in the United
- 19 States and other developed countries would be reduced by
- 20 forty-two percent (42%) by longer duration of
- 21 breastfeeding; and

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- 23 WHEREAS, many new mothers choose to use formula or other
- 24 artificial food rather than to breastfeed even before they

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- 1 leave the hospital, and only a small percentage of all
- 2 mothers are still breastfeeding when their babies are six
- 3 (6) months old; and

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- 5 WHEREAS, studies now show that babies who are not breastfed
- 6 have higher rates of death, meningitis, childhood leukemia
- 7 and other cancers, diabetes, respiratory illnesses,
- 8 bacterial and viral infections, diarrheal diseases, otitis
- 9 media, allergies, obesity and developmental delays.
- 10 Breastfeeding may raise an infant's intelligence quotient;
- 11 and

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- 13 WHEREAS, the social constraints of modern society weigh
- 14 against the choice of breastfeeding and lead new mothers
- 15 with demanding time schedules and uninformed employers to
- 16 opt for formula feeding; and

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- 18 WHEREAS, any genuine promotion of family values should
- 19 encourage public acceptance of this most basic act of
- 20 nurture between a mother and her child and no mother should
- 21 be made to feel incriminated or embarrassed for
- 22 breastfeeding her child.

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- 1 Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By The Members of the
- 2 Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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- 4 **Section 1.** That the Wyoming State Legislature
- 5 recognizes that breastfeeding is an important and basic act
- 6 of nurture which should be encouraged in the interests of
- 7 maternal and child health.

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- 9 **Section 2.** That the Legislature encourages
- 10 breastfeeding in all situations and congratulates
- 11 employers, both in the public and the private sector, who
- 12 accommodate breastfeeding mothers.

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- 14 Section 3. That the Legislature supports the right of
- 15 a woman to breastfeed in any location where she has the
- 16 right to be with her child.

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- 18 **Section 4.** That the Legislature strongly encourages
- 19 any state agency that administers programs providing
- 20 maternal or child health services to provide information
- 21 that encourages breastfeeding to program participants who
- 22 are pregnant women or mothers with infants.
