A BILL

1 AN ACT relating to medical care; authorizing various

- 2 studies relating to medical errors, medical malpractice
- 3 insurance and tort reform generally; specifying duties of
- 4 the Wyoming health care commission; requiring reports and
- 5 recommendations; providing appropriations; and providing
- 6 for an effective date.

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8 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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10 *** STAFF COMMENTS ***

This draft combines three study bills requested by individual sponsors for the special session. All related to medical care and are malpractice insurance issue. The first study is being sponsored as a separate bill by the joint Labor and Health and Judiciary committees. has been included in this draft based upon the direction to combine all study bills into one draft. Other than to require the studies to be done by the health care commission and the insurance commissioner as specifically discussed

1 at the last meeting, there has been no attempt to 2 make the studies uniform regarding when reports 3 are due etc., it seemed appropriate to leave the differences as items for the JAC to debate. 4 specific inclusion of the insurance commissioner 5 in the first study is not within the bill draft 6 7 being sponsored by the Labor and Health and 8 Judiciary Committees. The study under section 2 9 was initially drafted for the individual sponsor as a Legislative/Executive Committee study, with 10 10 legislators and the governor's representative. 11 12 It was changed to a health care commission study 13 per the JAC discussion. 14 Section 1. 15 16 17 (a) The Wyoming health care commission with 18 assistance from the insurance commissioner shall study the feasibility, costs and benefits of a new system of dealing 19 20 with health care errors and health care malpractice which 21 has the following characteristics: 22 (i) Definition and identification of health care errors;

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26 (ii) Identification of general and systemic

27 causes of health care errors;

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29 (iii) Reporting of health care errors to a

30 health care errors commission; 1

2 (iv) Prevention of health care errors through

3 systemic improvements that enhance patient safety;

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5 (v) A system to compensate individuals, as their

exclusive remedy, for damages resulting from health care 6

7 errors, including payment for:

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9 (A) All health care expenses arising from

10 the error; and

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12 (B) Other expenses and lost opportunities,

including loss of actual and potential earnings, increased 13

living expenses, decreased quality of life and other 14

compensation as appropriate and as provided through a 15

schedule or formula. 16

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(b) The study shall provide information about: 18

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20 (i) The characteristics identified in subsection

21 (a) of this section;

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23 (ii) The probable costs of the system including

but not limited to the costs of administration, the costs 24

- 1 of improvements to the health care system needed to prevent
- 2 future errors, the cost of compensating those persons
- 3 injured by errors and the costs to health care
- 4 professionals in providing the financial resources
- 5 necessary to support the system;

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- 7 (iii) The size of the health care errors
- 8 commission and the appropriate mix of health care
- 9 professionals, attorneys and public representatives on the
- 10 commission;

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- 12 (iv) The administration and management of the
- 13 commission including staffing and procedures for handling
- 14 claims;

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- 16 (v) The schedules or formulas necessary to
- 17 determine the compensation of people injured by health care
- 18 errors;

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- 20 (vi) The appropriate means for a person
- 21 aggrieved by an action of the commission to appeal to the
- 22 courts;

(vii) An analysis of this system's costs and 1

2 benefits for health care professionals and the public

3 compared to the present system of tort;

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5 (viii) Any other factors the health care

commission deems relevant to the general topic. 6

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(c) The completed study shall be submitted to the 8

9 joint labor, health and social services interim committee

by October 15, 2005. 10

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12 Section 2.

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14 The Wyoming health care commission with (a)

assistance from the insurance commissioner shall study 15

issues relating to insurance reform issues specified in 16

17 this subsection. The commission shall report to the

18 management council its findings, including

19 recommendations for legislation. The report shall be

provided not later than November 1, 2005. The commission 20

21 shall study:

1	(i) Self insurance pools or state-funded
2	insurance programs to provide excess liability insurance
3	for health care providers;
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5	(ii) The Nebraska excess liability fund;
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7	(iii) The practicality of a Nebraska style
8	excess liability fund for Wyoming health care providers;
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10	(iv) Similarities and differences between the
11	Nebraska and Wyoming tort systems, as they would affect the
12	practicality or advisability of a Nebraska style excess
13	liability fund in Wyoming;
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15	(v) Estimated capitalization and other start-up
16	expenses for an excess liability self-insurance pool or
17	state-funded insurance program;
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19	(vi) Any other issues the commission deems
20	appropriate and necessary for this study.
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22	Section 3.

Wyoming health care commission with 1 (a) The 2 assistance of the insurance commissioner shall conduct a 3 study on the feasibility of requiring physicians, hospitals 4 or combinations of physicians and hospitals to create one 5 (1) or more risk retention groups for the purposes of providing medical malpractice liability insurance to 6 7 physicians, hospitals or combinations of physicians and hospitals providing medical care to persons in this state. 8 9 The study shall include: 10 11 (i) A determination of the number of physicians 12 who practice in this state and the number of hospitals that 13 exist in this state; 14 15 (ii) A review of the historical and expected 16 loss experiences of medical malpractice liability insurers, 17 including risk retention groups, that have insured physicians, hospitals or combinations of physicians and 18 hospitals against loss associated with medical malpractice 19 20 in this state;

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22 (iii) A review of expected coverages,

23 deductibles, limits, rates and rating classification

1 systems based upon current industry practices in this state

2 and in other states;

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4 (iv) A review of reserve fund requirements

5 necessary for group solvency;

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7 (v) An examination of and recommendations

8 regarding risk retention group management, underwriting

9 procedures, managerial oversight methods and investment

10 policies;

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12 (vi) An examination of the probable impact of

13 requiring creation of and membership in one (1) or more

14 risk retention groups upon the current market for medical

15 liability insurance;

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17 (vii) An evaluation of the feasibility of using

18 other programs in addition to or in correlation with one

19 (1) or more risk retention groups, including the medical

20 liability compensation account;

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22 (viii) Recommendations regarding the manner in

23 which one (1) or more risk retention groups may be created

1 and participation therein by physicians, hospitals or

2 combinations of physicians and hospitals required.

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- On or before November 15, 2004, the commission 4 (b)
- shall report study findings to the joint appropriations 5
- 6 interim committee, to the joint corporations, elections and
- 7 political subdivisions interim committee and to the joint
- 8 judiciary interim committee. The report shall include the
- information specified in subsection (a) of this section and 9
- 10 any recommendations regarding necessary legislation.

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12 Section 4.

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- 14 (a) There is appropriated to the Wyoming health care
- commission up to two hundred forty thousand dollars 15
- 16 (\$240,000.00) from the budget reserve account for the
- 17 purposes of the study authorized by section 1 of this act.

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- 19 (b) There is appropriated from the budget reserve
- account to the Wyoming health care commission fifty 20
- 21 thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) or as much thereof as is
- 22 necessary for purposes of the study required by section 2
- 23 of this act.

1 (c) There is appropriated from the budget reserve
2 account to the Wyoming health care commission sixty
3 thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) or as much thereof as is
4 necessary for purposes of the study required by section 3
5 of this act. Funds appropriated under this section shall
6 fund actuarial assistance and other administrative expenses
7 necessary to support study efforts.
