A BILL

for

- 1 AN ACT relating to state lands; authorizing the purchase of
- 2 lands to be known as the homestake lands; providing
- 3 appropriations; and providing for an effective date.

5 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

7 **Section 1.** W.S. 36-8-1401 is created to read:

- 9 ARTICLE 14
- 10 HOMESTAKE LANDS

12 **36-8-1401**. Purchase of lands; description of lands.

13

- 14 The board of land commissioners is hereby authorized and
- 15 empowered to purchase in the name of the state of Wyoming
- 16 and to pay an amount not to exceed thirty million dollars
- 17 (\$30,000,000.00) less costs of appraisal or one hundred ten

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1 percent (110%) of the appraised value, whichever is less, 2 lands in Crook county containing for the homestake 3 approximately thirty thousand six hundred (30,600) acres 4 which are hereby declared to be state lands to be known as 5 the homestake lands. The board of land commissioners shall hold title to and administer the homestake lands through 6 7 2005 legislative session. The board of commissioners shall create an advisory management team 8 9 consisting of not more than nine (9) members representing, 10 equally as possible, the various multiple 11 contemplated for the homestake lands, including hunting and 12 game management, livestock grazing, snowmobiling and other 13 recreation, forestry, historic preservation and land The board of land commissioners 14 conservation. cooperation with the management team, shall submit to the 15 legislature, prior to December 31, 2004, a recommendation 16 17 for management and administration of the homestake lands after the 2005 legislative session. 18

22 (a) Notwithstanding W.S. 9-4-310 (b), thirty million 23 dollars (\$30,000,000.00), or as much thereof as is

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1 necessary, is appropriated to the state land board from the

2 general fund for the purposes of this act.

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- 4 (b) Notwithstanding subsection (a) of this section,
- 5 two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.00), or as much
- thereof as is necessary, is appropriated from the general 6
- 7 fund to the state land board for necessary expenses
- required to review the land as provided in section 3 of 8
- 9 this act and to administer the land through the 2005
- 10 legislative session.

Section 3. 12

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- (a) After consultation with members of the state land 14
- board, the Wyoming legislature finds that purchase of the 15
- homestake lands by the state of Wyoming is feasible and 16
- 17 desirable to maintain open spaces, a historical recreation
- area, traditional agricultural and timbering uses and 18
- turkey, elk and other species of wildlife for the citizens 19
- 20 of Wyoming on all or a portion of the homestake lands and
- 21 prevent possible subdivision of the lands which would

22 impair those uses.

1 (b) In preparing and submitting a report and

2 recommendations to the Wyoming legislature, the land board

3 shall specifically address at least the following areas:

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5 (i) The report and recommendations shall contain

6 information relating to reasonable revenue estimates from

7 ownership of the lands attributable to agricultural

8 leasing, timber production, recreational income, possible

9 income from leases with the Wyoming game and fish

10 commission, Wyoming parks and cultural resources

11 commission, or any private organizations and any other

12 possible uses;

13

14 (ii) A complete and comprehensive appraisal of

15 the lands including the amount of property taxes currently

16 being paid to local governments on the lands. The property

17 shall be retained on the tax rolls and the land board shall

18 recommend sources for state or private payment of future

19 taxes;

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21 (iii) The result of meetings or hearings with

22 interested persons and governmental entities in the area,

23 state agencies and other members of the Wyoming public.

1 The report shall make recommendations regarding how the 2 lands should be managed and administered in the future;

3

4 (iv) Possibilities for future exchanges of some

5 portions of the lands with the federal government to

increase access to existing federal lands, increase timber 6

7 available to sustain private timber production in the area,

recreational, agricultural and other values of importance 8

9 to the Wyoming public and portions of the lands, if any,

10 that might be suitable for privatization and public sale in

11 the future;

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significance 13 (v) Any other matters of as

14 determined by the members of the state land board.

15

16 Section 4. This act is effective immediately upon

17 completion of all acts necessary for a bill to become law

as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of the 18

19 Constitution.
