for

- 1 A JOINT RESOLUTION requesting Congress to waive the
- 2 requirements contained within No Child Left Behind Act of
- 3 2001 to accommodate Wyoming's special circumstances.

4

- 5 WHEREAS, on January 8, 2002, President Bush signed into law
- 6 the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, referred to in this
- 7 resolution as NCLB, which applies to all states that accept
- 8 federal Title I funds; and

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- 10 WHEREAS, the State of Wyoming receives federal Title I
- 11 funds and is therefore subject to the requirements
- 12 contained within NCLB; and

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- 14 WHEREAS, NCLB mandates that every public school in Wyoming
- 15 must make adequate yearly progress toward the goal of one

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- 1 hundred percent (100%) student proficiency in mathematics
- 2 and reading by school year 2013-2014; and

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- 4 WHEREAS, NCLB requires that an entire school be identified
- 5 as failing to make adequate yearly progress in any school
- 6 year in which the school as a whole or any one (1) of an
- 7 identified subgroup fails to make adequate yearly progress,
- 8 including students with disabilities and students with
- 9 limited English proficiency; and

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- 11 WHEREAS, it may be difficult for a subgroup of students
- 12 with disabilities to make adequate yearly progress in each
- 13 of the measured content areas each year, since those
- 14 students are identified as belonging in that subgroup
- 15 because of significant educational challenges, well above
- 16 the challenges encountered by nondisabled students, that
- 17 adversely affect their capacities to achieve proficiency in
- 18 the measured content areas; and

- 20 WHEREAS, it will be difficult for a subgroup of students
- 21 with limited English proficiency to meet adequate yearly
- 22 progress in the content area of reading since those
- 23 students are required to be tested in English after only
- 24 three (3) years in the public school system, which is an

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1 insufficient amount of time for such students to become

2 proficient in English; and

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4 WHEREAS, failure by either the students with disabilities

5 subgroup or the limited English proficiency subgroup in any

6 given year to meet any one (1) of Wyoming's proficiency

7 expectations for that year will result in identification of

8 the school as a whole as failing to make adequate yearly

9 progress; and

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11 WHEREAS, NCLB imposes a series of escalating consequences

12 and financial costs on local schools and school districts

13 that fail to make adequate yearly progress for two (2) or

14 more consecutive years, including offering intradistrict

15 school choice and transportation, supplemental educational

16 services, and the possibility of dismissal of teachers,

17 paraprofessionals and administrators who are considered

18 "relevant" to the school's failure to make adequate yearly

19 progress; and

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21 WHEREAS, NCLB requires the state of Wyoming to develop

22 additional new assessments in grades three, five, six and

23 seven, which will further limit the time that teachers and

1 students are able to spend on achieving proficiency in

2 content areas required for state graduation; and

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4 WHEREAS, NCLB also requires all Wyoming public school

5 teachers who teach in core academic subjects to meet

6 federal "highly qualified" standards by the end of school

7 year 2005-2006, with teachers new to the profession having

8 to pass a rigorous state test in the content areas they

9 will be teaching; and

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11 WHEREAS, NCLB also requires all paraprofessionals and

12 education technicians working in programs funded by federal

13 Title I funds to meet certification standards that are

14 often higher than those currently imposed in Wyoming; and

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16 WHEREAS, NCLB imposes significant costs on local school

17 districts, teachers and paraprofessionals for the funding

18 of staff development, certification upgrades, course work,

19 choice-related transportation and supplemental educational

20 services, as well as the unavoidable costs and dislocation

21 that would arise under mandatory school restructuring and

22 staff dismissals; and

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- 1 WHEREAS, the State of Wyoming has had high education
- 2 standards since 1997, long before enactment of NCLB,
- 3 including the comprehensive statewide assessment of student
- 4 achievement through the statewide assessment system known
- 5 as WyCAS, and including a system of local assessments
- 6 within each local school district; and

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- 8 WHEREAS, the State of Wyoming for many years has been one
- 9 of the highest-ranked states in the nation for student
- 10 achievement, ranking high in the nation in 2001 in the
- 11 National Assessment of Educational Progress scores, ranking
- 12 high in the nation in 2001 for small class size, per pupil
- 13 funding and adequacy, and ranking high in the nation in
- 14 2001 in the state high school completion rate and regularly
- 15 ranking among the top states in the nation in student
- 16 academic performance on national testing in grades four and
- 17 eight; and

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- 19 WHEREAS, the State of Wyoming has obtained its strong
- 20 educational achievements through the efforts of its
- 21 students, teachers and schools and its own system of public

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22 education prior to enactment of NCLB; and

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1 WHEREAS, enactment of NCLB has resulted in only a four

2 million nine hundred thousand dollar (\$4,900,000.00)

3 increase in Title I funding for the state in 2002 over and

4 above the 2001 level that applied before NCLB mandates; and

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6 WHEREAS, the Congressional appropriation for Title I was

7 three billion one hundred fifty million dollars

8 (\$3,150,000,000.00) short of the Congressional

9 authorization in 2002 and four billion three hundred twenty

10 million dollars (\$4,320,000,000.00) short in 2003, and a

11 projected six billion one hundred fifty million dollars

12 (\$6,150,000,000.00) short in 2004, for a total shortfall of

13 thirteen billion two hundred million dollars

(\$13,200,000,000.00) over the three (3) year period.

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16 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MEMBERS OF THE

17 LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WYOMING:

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19 **Section 1.** That the Wyoming State Legislature, on

20 behalf of the State's outstanding system of public

21 education, respectfully requests the President of the

22 United States and the Congress of the United States to

23 accommodate Wyoming's special circumstances by issuing a

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1 waiver of the requirements under the No Child Left Behind

2 Act of 2001 for Wyoming's public schools.

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4 Section 2. That in the event such a waiver is not

5 forthcoming, the Wyoming State Legislature respectfully

6 requests the Congress of the United States to appropriate

7 full and complete funding of the No Child Left Behind Act

8 sufficient to fund the authorization levels specified

9 within the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001.

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11 Section 3. That the Secretary of State of Wyoming

12 transmit copies of this resolution to the President of the

13 United States, to the President of the Senate and the

14 Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United

15 States Congress, to the Wyoming Congressional Delegation,

16 to the Governor of Wyoming and to the Wyoming State

17 Superintendent of Public Instruction.
