State assessment-accountability system-2.

for

relating to 1 ACT public education; specifying AN 2 requirements for the statewide assessment of student 3 performance; establishing a statewide accountability system 4 for the state, school districts and schools with respect to student performance; imposing duties upon the state board 5 of education and a statewide task force for statewide 6 7 accountability; specifying assessment assessment and 8 timelines and requiring a pilot test for the assessment 9 system; imposing reporting requirements; providing 10 appropriations; and providing for effective dates.

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12 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

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14 Section 1. W.S. 21-2-304(a)(v) and by creating a new 15 paragraph (vi) and 21-3-110(a)(xxiv) are amended to read: 16

21-2-304. Duties of the state board of education. 1 2 3 The state board of education shall: (a) 4 5 (V) Through the state superintendent and in consultation and coordination with local school districts, 6 7 implement and maintain a statewide assessment system for measuring comprised of a coherent system of measures that 8 9 when combined, provide a reliable and valid measure of 10 individual student achievement for each public school and 11 school district within the state, and the performance of the state as a whole. Improvement of teaching and learning 12 13 in schools and fostering school program improvement shall 14 be the primary purposes of statewide assessment of student performance in Wyoming. The statewide assessment system 15

- 16 shall:
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18 <u>(A) Measure individual</u> student <u>performance</u> 19 <u>and</u> progress <u>based upon</u> <u>substantially aligned with the</u> 20 uniform educational program and student content and 21 performance standards imposed by law and by board rule and 22 regulation<u>;</u>. The assessment system shall

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1	<u>(B) B</u> e administered at appropriate levels
2	at specified grades and at appropriate intervals aligned to
3	the standards $_{\underline{\prime}}$. The assessment system shall be aligned to
4	the statewide educational program standards, shall
5	specifically assess assessing student performance in
6	reading, writing and mathematics at grades four (4), eight
7	(8) and eleven (11), and effective school year 2005-2006,
8	and each school year thereafter, assessing student
9	performance in reading, writing and mathematics at grades
10	three (3) through eight (8) and at grade eleven (11). In
11	addition and commencing school year 2007-2008 and each
12	school year thereafter, the statewide assessment system
13	shall assess student performance in science not less than
14	once within each grade band for grades three (3) through
15	five (5), grades six (6) through eight (8) and grades ten
16	(10) through twelve (12). The structure and design of the
17	assessment system shall allow for the comprehensive
18	measurement of student performance through assessments that
19	are administered each school year simultaneously on a
20	statewide basis and through assessments administered
21	periodically over the course of the school year which are
22	designed to provide a more comprehensive and in-depth
23	measurement of subject areas aligned to the state content
24	and performance standards. The assessment system may also

1	measure the other common core of knowledge and skills
2	established under W.S. 21-9-101(b) which can be
3	quantified <u>;</u> .
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5	(C) In addition to subparagraph (a)(v)(B)
6	of this section, measure student performance in Wyoming on
7	a comparative basis with student performance nationally;
8	
9	(D) Measure year-to-year changes in student
10	performance and progress in the subjects specified under
11	subparagraph (a)(v)(B) of this section and compare and
12	evaluate student achievement during the process of student
13	advancement through grade levels. The assessment system
14	shall ensure the integrity of student performance
15	measurements used at each grade level to enable valid year-
16	to-year comparisons;
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18	(E) Include multiple measures and item
19	types including grade appropriate multiple choice and open-
20	ended testing such as constructed-response, extended-
21	response and performance-based tasks, to ensure alignment
22	to the statewide student content and performance standards;
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1	(F) Provide a fair and unbiased assessment
2	of student performance without regard to race, ethnicity,
3	limited English proficiency and socioeconomic status;
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5	(G) Provide appropriate accommodations or
6	alternative assessments to enable the assessment of
7	students with disabilities as specified under W.S.
8	21-9-101(c)(i) and students with limited English
9	proficiency;
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11	(H) Provide a measure of accountability to
12	enhance teaching and learning in Wyoming and in combination
13	with other measures and information, assist school
14	districts in determining individual student progress. The
15	assessment results <u>will shall</u> be <u>reported to students,</u>
16	parents, schools, school districts and the public in an
17	accurate, complete and timely manner and shall be used in
18	conjunction with a school district's annual assessment to
19	design educational strategies for improvement and
20	enhancement of student performance. This design for
21	improvement shall be part of each district's school
22	improvement plan. In consultation and coordination with
23	school districts, the board shall review and evaluate the
24	assessment system regularly and based upon uniform

1 statewide reports from each district, annually report to 2 the legislature on student performance at specified grade levels and on school improvement plans. 3 4 5 (vi) Effective school year 2005-2006 and each school year thereafter, through the state superintendent 6 7 and in consultation and coordination with local school districts, by rule and regulation establish a statewide 8 accountability system providing annual accountability 9 determinations for all schools and school districts 10 11 imposing a range of educational consequences resulting from 12 accountability determinations whereby: 13 14 The continuous improvement of student (A) achievement at all schools and appropriate educational 15 16 interventions fostering continuous improvement serve as the 17 basis for statewide accountability system design;

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19 <u>(B) Annual accountability determinations</u> 20 within the system are made for each school based upon 21 adequate yearly progress measures defined by the federal No 22 Child Left Behind Act of 2001, as may be subsequently 23 amended, and the school's progress in improving student 24 achievement as measured by adequate yearly progress data

1	and by data from the district's body of evidence assessment
2	system required under W.S. 21-3-110(a)(xxiv) and from other
3	related sources which improve the reliability of
4	accountability determinations as prescribed by rule and
5	regulation of the board;
6	
7	(C) To the extent possible, appropriate
8	consequences resulting from accountability determinations
9	are made subject to the discretion of school districts.
10	The system shall establish a range of consequences which
11	increase in the degree of intensity over time, with
12	significant interventions imposed only upon repeated
13	failure to meet school improvement and performance criteria
14	over a consecutive period of time;
15	
16	(D) Teacher and administrator quality and
17	student remediation are the focus of consequences imposed
18	upon schools failing to meet school improvement and
19	performance criteria and target levels;
20	
21	(E) A range of rewards is provided to
22	schools meeting school improvement and performance criteria
23	at levels set by the state board.
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21-3-110. Duties of boards of trustees. 1 2 The board of trustees in each school district 3 (a) 4 shall: 5 6 (xxiv) Establish a student assessment system to 7 measure student performance relative to the uniform student content and performance standards in all content areas for 8 9 which the state board has promulgated standards pursuant to 10 W.S. 21-2-304(a)(iii). To the extent required by the state 11 board under W.S. 21-2-304(a)(v) and (vi), the district 12 assessment system shall be integrated with the statewide 13 assessment system and the statewide accountability system. 14 A component of the district assessment system required by this paragraph shall include a body of evidence assessment 15 16 system designed and used to determine the various levels of 17 student performance as described in the uniform student content and performance standards relative to the common 18 core of knowledge and skills prescribed under W.S. 19 20 21-9-101(b); 21

22 Section 2. [STATEWIDE TASK FORCE]

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The statewide task force established by 2003 1 (a) 2 Chapter 208, Section 201, Session Laws, shall in 3 consultation with the state board of education, the state 4 superintendent and the department of education, continue 5 the development, design and oversight of the implementation of the statewide assessment system prescribed by W.S. 6 21-2-304(a)(v), as amended by section 1 of this act, to be 7 completed in sufficient time for implementation in the 8 9 2005-2006 school year. Any vacancy in the membership of 10 the task force shall be filled by the appointing authority 11 prescribed under 2003 Session Laws, Chapter 208, Section 12 201(b). At its first meeting following the effective date 13 of this act, the task force shall select a chairman from 14 among its membership to conduct task force meetings and during periods between task force meetings and on behalf of 15 the task force, to work with staff to the task force, the 16 17 state board, the state superintendent and the department of education. For purposes of carrying out the requirements 18 of this section and to ensure the assessment system adheres 19 20 principles of sound education policy to and test 21 measurement, necessary technical, policy and legal experts and representatives from the education community and 22 federal and state governmental agencies shall be assembled 23

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task force through 1 on behalf of the the state 2 superintendent and the department of education. 3 4 (b) In designing the statewide assessment system and 5 overseeing the implementation of subsection (a) of this section, the task force shall ensure the assessment system 6 7 contains the following: 8 9 (i) Criteria defining levels of student performance on statewide assessments, as established by the 10 11 state board of education and developed by the department of 12 education; 13

14 (ii) A sufficient scope and extent of state 15 education program content and performance standards 16 necessary to ensure appropriate coverage of the full depth 17 and breadth of state standards as required by the federal 18 No Child Left Behind Act of 2001;

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20 (iii) A framework which clearly specifies the 21 relationship between assessments periodically administered 22 over the course of the school year and the assessment 23 simultaneously administered statewide at the end of the 24 school year;

2 (iv) Statewide guidelines governing the types approximate portions of assessment items 3 within and 4 assessments administered periodically throughout the school 5 year and prescribing a process for establishing the use and extent of periodic assessments within 6 the statewide 7 assessment system.

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9 (C) In addition to subsection (b) of this section, the task force shall in consultation with the state board 10 11 of education, the state superintendent and the department 12 education, investigate the costs associated of with 13 consequences imposed by the statewide accountability system established under W.S. 21-2-304(a)(vi) as amended under 14 section 1 of this act, which implicate state, school 15 16 district and individual school response and action over and 17 above existing practices and levels of services provided in accordance with requirements and programs in effect prior 18 to implementation of this system. 19

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Section 3. [STUDENT ASSESSMENT TRANSITION PROCESS]
(a) In addition to section 2 of this act and in

24 consultation with the state board of education, the state

1 superintendent and the department of education, the 2 statewide task force shall establish necessary mechanisms 3 and processes to support the transition from the statewide 4 student assessment existing on the effective date of this 5 act to the student assessment system established in accordance with W.S. 21-2-304(a)(v) as amended by section 1 6 7 of this act. The process shall satisfy legal and technical requirements pertaining to student assessment and shall 8 9 provide for a pilot test of the statewide assessment to 10 enhance assessment design and development and to provide an empirical basis upon which to make valid educational 11 12 judgments on assessment results. The pilot test of the 13 assessment shall be administered during the 2004-2005 14 school year to enable full implementation of the statewide assessment in school year 2005-2006. 15

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17 (b) Based upon specifications and requirements developed by the task force under subsection (a) of this 18 section, the state board of education through the state 19 20 superintendent and the department of education, shall 21 develop and issue a request for proposal (RFP) for 22 statewide student assessment development in sufficient time for pilot testing during the 2004-2005 school year. 23 The 24 task force shall assist the state board, the state

1 superintendent and the department, in reviewing and 2 evaluating all proposals submitted in response to the RFP, 3 and if a proposal meets the specifications and requirements 4 developed by the task force pursuant to this section and 5 the proposal is approved by the task force, the state board through the state superintendent and the department, shall 6 7 accept the proposal and enter into contract to implement the proposal subject to funds appropriated under section 4 8 9 of this act sufficient to implement its provisions.

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11 (c) On or before November 1, 2004, the state board, 12 the state superintendent and the task force shall report to 13 the management council and the joint education interim 14 committee on recommendations developed under this section, clearly specifying progress on development of the statewide 15 16 assessment system, defining the assessment system and 17 reporting on the development and administration of a pilot test for the assessment. 18

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20 Section 4. [ACCOUNTABILITY SYSTEM TRANSITION PROCESS]21

22 (a) For school year 2004-2005 and prior to 23 implementation of recommendations developed under this 24 section, the state board of education shall through the

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1 state superintendent and the department of education and in 2 consultation with the statewide task force, establish a 3 transitional plan to provide a temporary system of rewards 4 and sanctions for all schools and school districts. Prior 5 to implementation, the transitional plan shall be presented to the joint education interim committee on or before 6 November 1, 2004. The transitional plan shall terminate 7 upon completion of the 2004-2005 school year. 8

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The statewide task force shall in consultation 10 (b) 11 with the state board of education and the state 12 superintendent and in addition to section 3 of this act and 13 based upon the investigation conducted under section 2(c) 14 of this act, report to the management council and the joint education interim committee on recommendations for the 15 16 establishment of a permanent process providing consequences 17 for school accountability as prescribed under W.S. 21-2-304(a)(vi), as amended by section 1 of this act. 18

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20 (c) In addition, the task force in consultation with 21 the state board and state superintendent, shall develop 22 recommendations on the range of rewards for schools meeting 23 adequate yearly progress measures and other criteria under

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1 the statewide accountability system established under W.S. 2 21-2-304(a)(vi), as amended by section 1 of this act. 3 4 **Section 5.** [APPROPRIATIONS] 5 dollars (\$1,000,000.00) 6 (a) One million is 7 appropriated from the general fund to the department of education to provide for the piloting of the statewide 8 9 assessment system design during school year 2004-2005 in accordance with the recommendations established by the 10 11 state board and the statewide task force pursuant to 12 section 3 of this act. The department shall report 13 expenditures under this subsection to the joint education interim committee, aligning expenditures to components of 14 15 the assessment system.

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17 (b) Up to three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00) is appropriated from funds made available to 18 the state under the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 19 20 2001 shall fund the expenses associated with activities 21 assigned to the statewide task force under section 2 of 22 this act, including necessary consulting expertise to the 23 task force. The legislative service office shall provide 24 necessary staff support for the statewide task force.

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2	Section 6. [EFFECTIVE DATES]
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4	(a) Except as provided by subsection (b) of this
5	section, this act is effective July 1, 2004.
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7	(b) Sections 2 through 5 of this act are effective
8	immediately upon completion of all acts necessary for a
9	bill to become law as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of
10	the Wyoming Constitution.
