13	This act may be cited as the "Wyoming Emergency Management				
14	Homeland Security Act".				
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16	19-13-102. Definitions.				
17					
18	(a) As used in this act:				
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20	(i) "County or county-city program" means a				
21	program created in accordance with the provisions of this				
22	act by the state or a political subdivision to perform				
23	local emergency management <u>homeland</u> security functions;				
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1	(ii) " Emergency management <u>Homeland security</u>"
2	means the preparation for and the carrying out of all
3	emergency functions essential to the recovery and
4	restoration of the economy by supply and resupply of
5	resources to meet urgent survival and military needs, other
6	than functions for which military forces are primarily
7	responsible, necessary to deal with disasters caused by
8	enemy attack, sabotage, terrorism, civil disorder or other
9	hostile action, or by fire, flood, earthquake, other
10	natural causes and other technological, industrial, civil
11	and political events. These functions include without
12	limitation the coordination of fire-fighting services,
13	police services, medical and health services, rescue,
14	engineering, attack warning services, communications,
15	radiological events, evacuation of persons from stricken
16	areas, emergency welfare services (civilian war aid),
17	emergency transportation, existing or properly assigned
18	functions of plant protection, temporary restoration of
19	public utility services, mitigation activities in areas
20	threatened by natural or technological hazards, and other
21	functions related to civilian protection, together with all
22	other activities necessary or incidental to the preparation
23	for any carrying out of the foregoing functions;
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1	(iii) "Emergency support task force" means an
2	emergency management a homeland security organization
3	created in accordance with the provisions of this act by
4	the state or a political subdivision to supplement
5	emergency management <u>homeland security</u> programs in a
6	stricken area;
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8	(v) "Director" means the homeland security
9	director, office of homeland security appointed pursuant to
10	W.S. 19-13-104;
11	
12	(vi) "Public safety agencies" means any federal,
13	state or political subdivision entity that provides
14	emergency and public safety services, including state
15	agencies employing peace officers enumerated in W.S.
16	6-1-104(a)(vi)(C) through (F) and approved for
17	participation by the commission, fire management services,
18	correctional services, <u>emergency management</u> <u>homeland</u>
19	security, emergency and disaster relief services and if
20	desired by county, municipal and federal law enforcement
21	agencies.

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23 19-13-103. Legislative determination; coordination 24 with federal government and other states.

2 (a) Because of the possibility of the occurrence of 3 disasters of unprecedented size and destructiveness 4 resulting from enemy attack, sabotage, terrorism, civil 5 disorder or other hostile action, or from fire, flood, earthquake, other natural causes and other technological 6 disasters, and to insure that preparations of Wyoming will 7 be adequate to deal with such disasters, and generally to 8 9 provide for the common defense and to protect the public peace, health and safety, and to preserve the lives and 10 11 property of the people of Wyoming, it is hereby found and 12 declared to be necessary:

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14 (i) To create a Wyoming emergency management 15 agency office of homeland security within the governor's 16 office, and to authorize the creation of local emergency 17 management homeland security programs in the political 18 subdivisions of the state;

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20 (ii) To confer upon the governor and upon the 21 executive heads or governing bodies of the political 22 subdivisions of the state the emergency powers provided 23 herein, and to provide for state assistance in the

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1 organization and maintenance of the emergency management 2 homeland security programs of such political subdivisions; 3 4 (iv) To provide for the rendering of mutual aid 5 among the political subdivisions of the state and with other states with respect to the carrying out of emergency 6 7 management homeland security functions. 8 9 It is further declared to be the purpose of this (b) 10 act and the policy of Wyoming that all emergency management 11 homeland security functions of this state be coordinated to 12 the maximum extent with the comparable functions of its 13 political subdivisions, of the federal government including 14 its various departments and agencies, of other states and localities, and of private agencies of every type, to the 15 16 end that the most effective preparation and use may be made 17 of the manpower, resources and facilities for dealing with any disaster that may occur. 18 19

20 19-13-104. Powers of governor generally; director,
21 office of homeland security.

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(a) The governor has general direction and control of
 the emergency management agency office of homeland

security, and is responsible for the carrying out of the 1 provisions of this act, and in the event of disaster beyond 2 3 local control, may assume direct operational control over all or any part of the emergency management homeland 4 5 security functions within Wyoming. The governor may delegate such powers to the director established under 6 7 subsection (d) of this section, or through the director to the coordinator of emergency management deputy director to 8 9 carry out this act. 10 (b) In performing his duties under this act, the 11 12 governor may cooperate with the federal government, with 13 other states and with private agencies in all matters pertaining to the disaster relief and emergency management 14 homeland security of this state and of the nation. 15 16 17 (c) In performing his duties under this act, the 18 qovernor may: 19 20 comprehensive (ii) Prepare a emergency 21 management homeland security plan and program for this state to be integrated into and coordinated with the 22 emergency management homeland security plans of the federal 23 government and of other states to the fullest possible 24

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1 extent, and coordinate the preparation of plans and 2 programs for emergency management homeland security by the 3 political subdivisions of this state to be integrated into 4 and coordinated with the emergency management homeland 5 security plan and program of this state to the fullest 6 possible extent;

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8 (iii) In accordance with the emergency 9 management homeland security plan and program for this 10 state, procure supplies and equipment, institute training 11 programs and public information programs and take all other 12 preparatory steps including the partial or full 13 mobilization of emergency management homeland security 14 organizations in advance of actual disaster, to insure the furnishing of adequately trained and equipped forces of 15 16 emergency management homeland security personnel in time of 17 need;

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19 (iv) Make such studies and surveys of the 20 industries, resources and facilities in this state as 21 necessary to ascertain the capabilities of the state and 22 its political subdivisions for meeting emergency management 23 <u>homeland security</u> requirements, and to plan for the most 24 efficient emergency use therefor;

2 (vi) Delegate any administrative authority 3 vested in him under this act, provide for the subdelegation 4 of any such authority and appoint, in cooperation with 5 local authorities, political subdivision emergency management coordinators. 6 7 (d) The position of the state director, office of 8 9 homeland security director is created in the governor's 10 office and shall be appointed by the governor. He shall be 11 responsible to the governor and may be removed by the governor as provided in W.S. 9-1-202. The director shall: 12 13 14 (i) Supervise the Wyoming emergency management agency office of homeland security; 15 16 (iii) Coordinate with the federal office 17 department of homeland security; and 18

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20 **19-13-105.** Homeland security program.

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(a) The <u>emergency management agency office of</u>
 <u>homeland security</u> within the governor's office is created.
 The governor shall appoint a <u>coordinator of emergency</u>

management deputy director, office of homeland security who may appoint such assistants as may be necessary. The coordinator deputy director and his assistants shall be compensated in an amount to be determined and fixed by the Wyoming human resources division. The coordinator deputy director shall serve at the pleasure of the governor and may be removed as provided in W.S. 9-1-202.

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The coordinator, with the approval of the 9 (b) 10 director, may employ technical, clerical, stenographic and 11 other personnel and make such expenditures within the appropriations or from other funds made available to him 12 13 for purposes of emergency management homeland security as 14 necessary to carry out this act. He shall be provided with necessary and appropriate office space, furniture, 15 16 equipment, stationery and printing in the same manner as 17 for personnel of other state agencies.

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19 (c) <u>In the absence of the director, the deputy</u>
20 <u>director</u> is the administrative head of the Wyoming
21 <u>emergency management agency office of homeland security</u>
22 and:

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1 (i) Shall be responsible to the governor for the 2 implementation of the state program for emergency 3 management homeland security for Wyoming; 4 5 (ii) Shall assist the local authorities and organizations in the planning and development of local 6 7 emergency management homeland security plans and programs; 8 9 (iii) Shall coordinate the activities of all 10 organizations for emergency management homeland security 11 within the state, including all state departments; 12 13 (iv) Shall maintain liaison with and cooperate 14 with emergency management homeland security agencies and programs of other states and of the federal government; 15 16 17 (V) Shall have additional authority, duties and responsibilities authorized by this act as 18 may be 19 prescribed by the governor or the director; and 20 21 19-13-107. Emergency support task forces. 22 23 (a) The governor or his duly authorized 24 representative and the governing bodies of political

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subdivisions may create and establish such number of 1 2 emergency support task forces as necessary to reinforce 3 emergency management homeland security programs in stricken 4 areas with due consideration of the plans of the federal 5 government and of other states. The governor or governing body of the political subdivision shall appoint for each 6 7 unit a coordinator who has primary responsibility for the organization, administration and operation of the unit. 8 9 Emergency support task forces shall be activated upon 10 orders of the governor or governing body of the political 11 subdivisions and shall perform their functions in any part 12 of the state, or upon conditions specified in this section, 13 in other states. The governor may remove any emergency 14 support task force member he appoints as provided in W.S. 15 9-1-202.

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1719-13-108. Local programs; authorized; local homeland18security plan; coordinators; appointment and removal.

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20 Each political subdivision of this state shall establish a 21 local emergency management <u>homeland security</u> program in 22 accordance with the state <u>emergency management homeland</u> 23 <u>security</u> plan and program. Each political subdivision 24 through the <u>emergency management homeland security</u> program

1 will cause to be prepared a local emergency operating 2 homeland security plan which will include actions essential 3 to the recovery and restoration of the economy by supply 4 and resupply of resources to meet urgent survival and 5 military needs and to provide for the ongoing management of resources available to meet continuing survival 6 and 7 recovery needs. Each local emergency management homeland security program shall have a coordinator appointed by the 8 9 governor upon the recommendation of the local jurisdiction. 10 coordinator has direct responsibility for the The 11 organization, administration and operation of the local 12 emergency management homeland security program subject to 13 the direction and control of the local jurisdiction under 14 the general direction of the governor. The governor may remove any coordinator as provided in W.S. 9-1-202. 15

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17 19-13-109. Local programs; reciprocal and mutual aid.
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(a) The local <u>emergency management</u> coordinators in collaboration with other public and private agencies within this state will develop or cause to be developed mutual aid arrangements for reciprocal <u>emergency management homeland</u> <u>security</u> aid and assistance in case of disaster of extreme nature which affects two (2) or more political subdivisions

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1	or is too great to be dealt with unassisted. The				
2	arrangements shall be consistent with the state emergency				
3	management homeland security plan and program, and in time				
4	of emergency each local <u>emergency management homeland</u>				
5	security program shall render assistance in accordance with				
6	the provisions of the mutual aid arrangements.				
7					
8	(b) The coordinator of each local emergency				
9	management <u>homeland security</u> program with the approval of				
10	the governor, may enter into mutual aid arrangements with				
11	emergency management <u>homeland security</u> agencies or				
12	organizations in other states for reciprocal emergency				
13	management aid and assistance in case of disaster too great				
14	to be dealt with unassisted.				
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16	19-13-110. Funds, supplies and equipment; generally.				
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18	(a) Each political subdivision may make				
19	appropriations for the payment of expenses of its local				
20	emergency management homeland security programs.				
21					
22	(b) Whenever the federal government or any agency or				
23	officer thereof or any person, firm or corporation shall				
24	offer to the state or to any political subdivision thereof				
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1 services, equipment, supplies, materials or funds by way of 2 gift, grant or loan for purposes of disaster relief or 3 emergency management homeland security, the state acting 4 through the governor, or the political subdivision acting 5 with the consent of the governor and through its executive officer or governing body, may accept the offer. Upon 6 acceptance the governor of the state or executive officer 7 or governing body of the political subdivision may 8 9 authorize any officer of the state or of the political 10 subdivision to receive the services, equipment, supplies, 11 materials or funds on behalf of the state or the political 12 subdivisions. This authority will include participation in 13 the federal surplus property program. All funds received from the federal government or any agency thereof shall be 14 deposited in an appropriate separate account together with 15 16 appropriated by a political subdivision, and funds 17 expenditures from the account shall be made only upon authority of the local governing body and only for the 18 19 purposes specified in this act.

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(c) The board of county commissioners in any county may levy a tax for the support and maintenance of county, city, town, county-city or county-town emergency management homeland security programs.

19-13-111. Funds, supplies and equipment; authority
to make use of existing facilities.

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5 In carrying out the provisions of this act, the governor and the executive officers or governing bodies of the 6 political subdivisions of the state are directed to utilize 7 the services, equipment, supplies and facilities of 8 9 existing departments, offices and agencies of the state and of the political subdivisions thereof to the maximum extent 10 practicable, and the officers and personnel of all 11 12 departments, offices and agencies are directed to cooperate 13 with and extend such services and facilities to the 14 governor, the coordinator director and the emergency management homeland security programs throughout the state 15 16 upon request.

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18 19-13-112. Programs barred from political activity.

20 No <u>emergency management homeland security</u> program 21 established under the authority of this act shall 22 participate in any form of political activity or be 23 employed directly or indirectly for political purposes.

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1 19-13-113. State and political subdivisions exempt 2 from liability; exceptions; license to practice not 3 required; homeland security worker defined; recognized 4 educational programs; real estate owners exempt from 5 liability.

6

7 (a) All activities relating to emergency management homeland security are governmental functions. The state, 8 9 any political subdivision, state agencies, and, except in 10 cases of willful misconduct, gross negligence or bad faith, 11 any emergency management homeland security worker complying 12 with or reasonably attempting to comply with W.S. 19-13-101 13 through 19-13-116, any order, rule or regulation 14 promulgated thereunder, or pursuant to any ordinance relating to blackout or other precautionary measures 15 16 enacted by any political subdivision of the state, or in 17 training for such activity, is not liable for the death of or injury to persons or for damage to property as a result 18 of the activity or training. This section shall not affect 19 20 the right of any person to receive benefits to which he 21 would otherwise be entitled under W.S. 19-13-101 through 22 19-13-116, under the Wyoming Worker's Compensation Act, or under any pension law, nor affect the right of any person 23

1 to receive benefits or compensation under any act of 2 congress.

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4 (b) Any requirement for a license to practice any 5 professional, mechanical or other skill does not apply to any authorized emergency management homeland security 6 7 worker who, in the course of performing emergency management homeland security duties, practices a 8 9 professional, teaching, training, mechanical or other skill 10 during an emergency management homeland security emergency, 11 in training for an emergency or during emergency management 12 homeland security exercises.

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14 (c) As used in this section "emergency management homeland security worker" includes any full or part-time 15 paid, volunteer or auxiliary employee of any state, 16 17 territories or possessions of the United States, the District of Columbia, any neighboring country, 18 any political subdivision thereof, or any agency or program 19 20 performing emergency management homeland security services 21 at any place in this state subject to the order or control 22 of or pursuant to a request of the state government or any political subdivision thereof and includes instructors and 23 24 students in recognized educational programs where emergency

management homeland security services are taught. A 1 2 recognized educational program includes programs in 3 educational institutions duly existing under the laws of 4 this state and such other educational programs as are 5 established by the emergency management agency office of homeland security or otherwise under this act. 6 7 8 19-13-114. Persons advocating change by force or 9 violence in form of government prohibited from employment 10 or association; oath. 11 12 (a) No person shall be employed or associated in any 13 capacity in any emergency management homeland security 14 program established under this act: 15 16 (b) Each person appointed to serve in an emergency 17 management homeland security program, before entering upon his duties, shall take an oath in writing before a person 18 authorized to administer oaths in this state, substantially 19 20 as follows: 21 22 "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the constitution of the United States 23

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and the constitution of the state of Wyoming against all

1 enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith 2 and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation 3 freely without any mental reservation or purpose of 4 evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the 5 duties on which I am about to enter."

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7 "And I do further swear (or affirm) that I do not advocate, nor am I a member or an affiliate of any 8 9 organization, group or combination of persons that 10 advocates the overthrow of the government of the United 11 States or of this state by force or violence; and that 12 during such time as I am a member of the (name of emergency 13 management homeland security program) I will not advocate nor become a member of any political party or organization 14 that advocates the overthrow of the government of the 15 16 United States or of this state by force or violence."

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18 19-13-115. Admission of professional personnel of 19 other states in emergency.

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In the event disaster conditions in Wyoming require visitation to this state by emergency management homeland <u>security</u> personnel from other states, including physicians, dentists, veterinarians, nurses or other professional

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1 personnel, reciprocity by way of allowing those 2 professional persons to practice their professional talents 3 without the normal admissions to practice in this state 4 during the period of the emergency, is allowed.

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6 19-13-116. Enforcement of orders, rules and 7 regulations.

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9 Every emergency management <u>homeland security</u> program 10 established pursuant to this act and the officers thereof 11 shall execute and enforce orders, rules and regulations 12 made by the governor under authority of this act. Each 13 organization shall have available for inspection at its 14 office all orders, rules and regulations made by the 15 governor or under his authority.

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- 17 **19-13-202.** Definitions.
- 18

19 (a) As used in this act, unless the context requires20 otherwise, the following definitions apply:

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(iv) "Mutual aid agreement" or "agreement" means an agreement, consistent with the purposes of this act, by one (1) or more fire protection services, emergency medical

care providers or local government subdivisions of this 1 2 state with one (1) or more fire protection services, 3 emergency medical care providers, emergency management 4 homeland security programs or local government subdivisions 5 of any other state or the United States; 6 7 (v) "Party emergency service" means a fire 8 protection service, emergency medical care provider, 9 emergency management homeland security program, local 10 government subdivision or agency of the United States that is a party to a mutual aid agreement as set forth in this 11 12 act;

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14 19-13-203. Authorization to enter agreement; general
15 content; authority.

16

17 (a) Any one (1) or more fire protection services, emergency medical care providers, emergency management 18 19 homeland security programs or local government subdivision 20 of this state may enter into a mutual aid agreement with 21 any one (1) or more fire protection services, emergency 22 medical care providers, emergency management homeland security programs or local government subdivisions of any 23 24 other state or the United States to provide emergency

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services to the area covered by the agreement. The
 agreement shall be authorized and approved by the governing
 body of each party to the agreement that is not an agency
 of the United States government.

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6 (c) A mutual aid agreement shall grant a fire 7 protection service, emergency management homeland security program or emergency medical care provider of this state 8 9 authority to operate outside of the state and shall grant 10 authority for a fire protection service, emergency 11 management homeland security program or emergency medical 12 care provider of another state or the United States to 13 operate within this state as if the fire service, emergency 14 management homeland security program or emergency medical care provider were organized and operated under the laws of 15 16 this state.

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18 19-13-205. Submission of agreement to attorney
19 general.

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(b) The attorney general shall approve an agreement submitted to him under this act unless he finds that it is not in proper form, does not meet the requirements set forth in this act, or otherwise does not conform to the

1 laws of this state. If he disapproves an agreement, he 2 shall provide a detailed written statement to the 3 appropriate governing bodies of the fire protection 4 services, emergency medical care providers, emergency 5 management homeland security programs and local government 6 subdivisions.

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8 19-13-207. Agreement not to relieve agency of duties.
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10 No agreement made under this act may relieve any fire 11 protection service, emergency medical care provider, 12 emergency management <u>homeland security</u> program or local 13 government subdivision of this state of a duty imposed upon 14 it by law. Timely performance of a duty created by a 15 mutual aid agreement may be offered in satisfaction of the 16 duty.

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18 **19-13-208.** Limitation of powers.

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20 Except for the right granted by this act to jointly 21 exercise powers, this act does not authorize any fire 22 protection service, emergency medical care provider, 23 <u>emergency management homeland security</u> program or local

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government subdivision of this state to exercise a power 1 2 that it is not otherwise authorized to exercise. 3 19-13-209. Right of state 4 in actions involving 5 agreements. 6 7 any case or controversy involving performance or In interpretation of or liability under a mutual aid agreement 8 9 entered into between one (1) or more fire protection 10 services, emergency medical care providers, emergency 11 management homeland security programs or local government 12 subdivisions of this state and one (1) or more fire 13 protection services, emergency medical care providers, 14 emergency management homeland security programs or local government subdivisions of another state or of the United 15 16 States, the parties to the agreement are the real parties 17 in interest. This state may maintain an action against any fire protection service, emergency medical care provider, 18 19 emergency management homeland security program or local 20 government subdivision whose default, failure, performance 21 or other conduct caused or contributed to a loss or

22 liability incurred by the state.

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19-13-210. Authorization to appropriate funds 1 for 2 purpose of agreement. 3 4 A fire protection service, emergency medical care provider, 5 emergency management homeland security program or local government subdivision of this state may appropriate funds 6 7 for and may sell, lease or otherwise supply material to any entity created for the purpose of performance of an 8 9 agreement and may provide such personnel or services 10 therefor as are within its authority to furnish.

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12 19-13-301. Search and rescue account; created;
13 expenditures.

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(b) Revenues deposited within the search and rescue 15 16 account shall be expended by the Wyoming emergency 17 management agency office of homeland security to reimburse counties for costs directly incurred in a specific search 18 and rescue operation, subject to W.S. 19-13-302 and rules 19 20 and regulations adopted by the Wyoming search and rescue 21 council. Expenditures for reimbursement pursuant to this 22 subsection shall receive priority over all other authorized 23 account expenditures. No revenues deposited within the

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account shall be used to reimburse counties for any salary 1 2 or benefits normally paid to its employees. 3 4 (c) Subject to subsection (b) of this section, the 5 Wyoming emergency management agency office of homeland security may expend revenues available within the search 6 and rescue account for other search and rescue program 7 purposes including: 8 9 10 19-13-302. Search and rescue account administration. 11 12 (a) Any county sheriff's office in this state may 13 make a claim on the search and rescue account for reimbursement of costs directly incurred in the performance 14 of search and rescue activities. Any claim made pursuant to 15 16 this subsection shall be submitted to the Wyoming emergency 17 management agency office of homeland security. Upon 18 receipt, the Wyoming emergency management agency office of homeland security shall transmit the claim to the Wyoming 19 20 search and rescue council for review and action in accordance with subsection (b) of this section. 21 22 Wyoming search and rescue council shall 23 (b) The

24 review and act upon all claims submitted under subsection

(a) of this section no later than June 30 following the 1 2 year in which expenses were incurred for the claim 3 submitted. If there are insufficient funds to pay all 4 approved claims, the Wyoming emergency management agency 5 office of homeland security shall prorate reimbursement among all approved claims. Payments authorized through the 6 7 Wyoming emergency management agency office of homeland security pursuant to this section shall be paid by the 8 9 state treasurer by warrant issued by the state auditor upon 10 vouchers signed by the director, Wyoming emergency 11 management coordinator office of homeland security or his 12 designee. 13 14 19-13-303. Search and rescue council; appointment; 15 vacancies; compensation; duties. 17 (a) The Wyoming search and rescue council is established and shall consist of eleven

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18 (11) voting members. The coordinator director of the Wyoming emergency 19 20 management agency office of homeland security or his 21 designee shall serve as a voting member and the permanent 22 executive secretary to the council. The governor shall appoint the remaining ten (10) members to serve four (4) 23 year terms as follows: 24

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2 **19-13-403.** General implementation.

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4 (c) On behalf of the governor of each state 5 participating in the compact, the legally designated state 6 official who is assigned responsibility for emergency 7 management homeland security will be responsible for 8 formulation of the appropriate interstate mutual aid plans 9 and procedures necessary to implement this compact.

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(c) Local emergency response authorities and regional emergency response teams shall be entitled to recover their reasonable and necessary costs incurred as a result of their response to a hazardous material or weapons of mass destruction incident. Costs subject to recovery under this act include, but are not limited to, the following:
