Mental health and substance abuse systems.

## A BILL

## for

1 AN ACT relating to the legislature; providing for a select committee on mental health and substance abuse services; 2 providing for membership of the select committee; providing 3 for studies and legislative recommendations; providing an 4 5 appropriation; and providing for an effective date. 6 7 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming: 8 Section 1. 9 10 (a) There is appropriated from the general fund to 11 12 the legislative service office thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) to be used for the select committee on mental 13 14 health and substance abuse services delivery in this state. 15 The committee shall study issues and propose legislation to provide more cost effective and accessible delivery of 16

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1 mental health and substance abuse services, including 2 recommendations regarding a regional approach to providing 3 those services. 4 (b) The committee shall consist of twelve 5 (12)members as follows: 6 7 (i) Six (6) members of the 8 house of 9 representatives, with not more than four (4) members from 10 the same political party. The members shall be appointed by the speaker of the house, who shall also appoint one (1) 11 12 of the members as cochairman of the committee; 13 14 (ii) Six (6) members of the senate, with not more than four (4) members from the same political party. 15 The members shall be appointed by the president of the 16 17 senate, who shall also appoint one (1) of the members as cochairman of the committee. 18 19 20 (c) State agencies shall provide information and 21 other support to the committee as requested. The 22 legislative service office shall staff the committee. The committee shall meet as necessary and shall report to the 23

24 joint judiciary interim committee, the joint appropriations

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1 interim committee and the joint labor health and social services interim committee its findings and recommendations 2 3 for statutory changes not later than November 1, 2005. The 4 findings and recommendations shall address: 5 (i) Funding sources and levels of funding for 6 mental health and substance abuse services in the state, 7 including levels of funding from federal, state, local and 8 9 private sources; 10 11 (ii) Availability of and access to mental health and substance abuse services in the state, including but 12 13 not limited to: 14 15 The number of (A) beds available in institutions and hospitals for mental health and substance 16 17 abuse treatment; 18 19 (B) The training available for and levels 20 of training achieved by health care providers providing 21 mental health and substance abuse services; and 22 23 (C) The number of persons utilizing health 24 care and substance abuse services annually in this state

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and estimates of the number of persons needing those 1 2 services but not utilizing the services. 3 4 (iii) The mental health and substance abuse 5 system of care to assess service continuum within prescribed regions of the state, including but not be 6 7 limited to: 8 9 (A) Child, adolescent and family mental health and substance abuse clinical and support services, 10 including a Medicaid waiver; 11 12 13 (B) Adult mental health and substance abuse clinical and support services; 14 15 16 (C) Recruitment and retention of 17 psychiatrists and other clinical and support staff. 18 19 (iv) Cost effective alternatives to current 20 methods of substance abuse and mental health services 21 delivery; 22 23 Funding issues including incremental and (V) significant erosion of ability to compete for clinical and 24

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1	support staff and evaluate funding and program issues
2	related to vocational and educational services;
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4	(vi) Accountability activities with respect to
5	comprehensiveness and appropriateness including standards,
6	contracting, data collection, report generation and fiscal
7	management procedures as appropriate;
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9	(vii) Assessment of progress made and
10	sufficiency of mental health and substance abuse services;
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12	(viii) Possible revisions of title 25 of the
13	Wyoming statutes concerning involuntary commitments
14	pertaining to persons with mental illness to achieve the
15	following:
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17	(A) Improvement to procedures to assure that
18	the most appropriate assessments, evaluations and
19	treatments are available, in the shortest possible time and
20	in the most appropriate location, for persons detained
21	under this statute, while protecting all rights of
22	individuals involved and considering the best value to the
23	state;
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(B) Cost management challenges to be met
between the state and each county.

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4 Section 2. This act is effective immediately upon 5 completion of all acts necessary for a bill to become law 6 as provided by Article 4, Section 8 of the Wyoming 7 Constitution.
