Quality child care incentives.

A BILL

for

AN ACT relating to child care facilities; providing for an early childhood development system within the department of family services as specified; providing criteria for the

4 quality rating of child care facilities as specified;

5 providing incentives for the professional development of

6 child care staff as specified; providing program priority

7 for at-risk children as specified; requiring reports;

8 granting rulemaking authority; providing an appropriation;

9 declaring legislative findings; and providing for an

10 effective date.

12 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

14 **Section 1.** W.S. 14-4-201 through 205 are created to

15 read:

2 ARTICLE 2 - EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT

3

4 14-4-201. Early childhood development system

5 **established.**

6

7 (a) An early childhood development system is created

8 for the purpose of providing quality early childhood

9 development services to children and families. The system

10 shall be administered by the department of family services

11 and shall consist of a quality rating system, support for

12 the participation of children and families in quality early

13 childhood development programs participating in the system,

14 incentives for the professional development of early

15 childhood staff and a public awareness program.

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17 (b) All rules and regulations that the department

18 promulgates under this article shall be done in

19 consultation with the department of education, the

20 department of workforce services, the department of health

21 and early childhood specialists at the University of

22 Wyoming.

- 1 (c) The state's responsibility for payments under this
- 2 chapter shall be limited to the amount of funding provided
- 3 for the early childhood development system by the state
- 4 legislature. The department may receive donations from
- 5 foundations or other private sources and may distribute
- 6 those in accordance with the provisions of this article.

8 14-4-202. Quality Ratings.

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- 10 (a) The department shall establish by rule and
- 11 regulation a process for evaluating and rating the quality
- 12 of early childhood development programs.

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- 14 (b) Any early childhood development program defined
- 15 in 14-4-101(vi), including preschools and developmental
- 16 preschools, may apply to the department to be evaluated and
- 17 rated.

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- 19 (c) The criteria to assess levels of quality shall be
- 20 defined by rule and regulation and shall include:

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- 22 (i) Indicators of quality child care, which
- 23 shall include but not be limited to:

1	(A) Child to staff ratios and group size;
2	
3	(B) Staff qualifications and education;
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5	(C) The learning environment, including
6	positive behavioral supports;
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8	(D) Program management; and
9	
10	(E) Family involvement.
11	
12	(ii) Access to developmental services for
13	infants and preschool children with developmental delays
14	and disabilities. Children served under the early
15	childhood development system who qualify for disability
16	services shall receive these services through a regional
17	developmental preschool that is supported by state funding
18	for this purpose, provided the parents or caretaker agree
19	to these services. These disability services shall not be
20	reimbursed through system payments provided under W.S. 14-
21	4-103;
22	
23	(iii) Access to programs that provide healthcare
24	or health care coverage for children;

2 (iv) Access to programs that offer educational and workforce training, including access to counseling, for 3 4 the parents or caretakers of the children being served 5 under this program; 6 7 (v) A partnership with the public health nurse infant home visitation program that provides assistance to 8 9 expectant and new mothers of low income families; 10 (vi) Preschool education that offers: 11 12 13 (A) An age-appropriate curriculum, 14 including positive behavioral supports; 15 (B) Class sizes as recommended by

16 17 professional standards; and

18

(c) Instruction by a certified teacher with 19 20 the appropriate certification or endorsement in early 21 childhood education.

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23 (vii) Engagement of parents and caretakers in 24 the provision of early childhood development services,

- 1 including activities that parents and caretakers can pursue
- 2 at home that promote early childhood learning and

3 development; and

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- 5 (viii) Other research based criteria that
- 6 promote social and cognitive development.

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8 14-4-203. Program Payments.

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- 10 (a) The department shall establish through rules and
- 11 regulations a method of providing payments to early
- 12 childhood development programs rated under the provisions
- 13 of this article to support the participation of children
- 14 and families in the programs. The payment to a program
- 15 shall be determined by a sliding fee schedule based upon
- 16 the level of the program's quality rating and the level of
- 17 family income of the participating child.

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- 19 (b) In the event state funds appropriated in support
- 20 of the early childhood development system are not
- 21 sufficient to provide payments for the participation of all
- 22 children, payments shall be provided first for the support
- 23 of at-risk infants and preschool children.

1 (c) For the purposes of this section, the term "atrisk infants and preschool children" means children from 2 birth through five (5) years of age who have one or more of 3 4 the following characteristics: 5 (i) Residence in a family with income not 6 7 exceeding two hundred fifty percent (250%) of the federal poverty level; 8 9 10 (ii) A parent with a documented history of drug or alcohol abuse; 11 12 13 (ii) A parent who has been found guilty of a 14 felony; 15 16 (iii) A developmental disability or delay; 17 (iv) A health related condition that indicates 18 19 the child may not arrive at kindergarten with the same

entering kindergarten.

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(d) Children who are receiving public funding for 23 24 early childhood development services under another state or

skills or ability to learn as the majority of children

1 federal program shall not be eligible for funding for those

2 services under this article.

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4 (e) In the delivery of services, early childhood

5 programs that receive funds under this article shall not

6 discriminate against any individual on the grounds of sex,

7 color, race, religion, national origin, disability, or age,

8 other than the age of the qualifying child.

10 **14-4-204.** Incentives.

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12 (a) The department by rule and regulation shall

13 establish incentives to encourage the staff of programs

14 participating in the early childhood development system to

15 attain certificates or degrees in early childhood

16 development or a related field. These incentives may

17 include scholarships and salary enhancements. Payments

18 under this section shall be conditioned upon:

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20 (i) The recipient of the incentive agreeing to

21 work for the participating program for a specified period

22 of time after receiving the certificate or degree; and

1 (ii) An in-cash cost sharing contribution from the program employing the staff member, which may include 2 3 financial assistance to the staff member in attaining the 4 certificate or degree or increased wages or benefits after 5 acquiring the certificate or degree. 6 (b) The department may provide incentives to early 7 childhood programs participating in the system to achieve a 8 9 higher quality rating or to provide care for infants or other children whose care may otherwise be difficult or 10 impossible to obtain in a community. 11 12 13 14-4-205. Public Awareness. 14 15 (a) The department shall develop and distribute 16 materials that: 17 18 (i) Promote knowledge of the early childhood 19 development system; 20 21 (ii) Promote an understanding of the benefits 22 that accrue to children, families and communities from 23 quality early childhood development programs, as based upon

the latest findings in research reports and studies; and

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2 (iii) Emphasize the importance of parental

responsibility and the involvement of the family in quality

4 early childhood development.

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6 Section 2:

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8 (a) The department of family services shall annually

9 report to the joint education interim committee, the joint

10 labor, health and social services interim committee and the

11 joint appropriations interim committee by October 1. The

12 report shall include:

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14 (i) The department's progress in establishing

15 the early childhood development system;

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17 (ii) The participating programs and their

18 ratings;

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20 (iii) The indicators and evaluation plan the

21 department has developed to assess the impact of the early

22 childhood development system on children, families and

23 communities, including but not limited to improvements in

24 cognitive and social development;

2 (iv) The measurable impacts of the early

3 childhood development system upon children, families and

4 communities;

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6 (v) Public awareness activities;

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(vi) System expenditures of public and private 8

9 funds; and

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11 (vii) Recommendations for changes in the system

12 or legislative changes.

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14 Section 3. Fourteen million three hundred thousand

eight hundred twenty-three dollars (\$14,300,823.00) is 15

appropriated from the general fund to the department of 16

17 family services to implement and administer the early

childhood development system. In addition, five positions 18

19 are authorized to the department to carry out the purposes

of this act. 20

Section 4. 22

(a) The legislature finds that extensive research 1 demonstrates that quality early childhood development 2 programs provide a foundation for a child's success in life 3 4 and result in: 5 6 (i) Fewer special education and other publicly funded educational and social services later in life; 7 8 9 (ii) Decreased drug and alcohol abuse; 10 11 (iii) Decreased child abuse and fewer contacts 12 with the criminal justice system; 13 14 (iv) Decreased likelihood of becoming a teenage 15 parent; 16 17 (v) Decreased need for welfare benefits; 18 (vi) Higher levels of verbal, mathematical and 19 intellectual achievement in kindergarten through twelfth 20 21 grade and better academic performance in general throughout 22 their lives; 23

1 (vii) Higher employment rates and lifetime 2 earnings; and 3 4 (viii) Increased likelihood of becoming tax 5 payers rather than tax users. 6 7 (b) Economic studies indicate that the public realizes a return of three dollars (\$3.00) to eight dollars 8 9 (\$8.00) in savings in public program expenditures during 10 the lifetime of the recipient for every dollar expended on 11 early childhood development programs. As a result, early 12 childhood development programs and services provide a greater return in economic and social value to the public 13 14 than the original expense. 15 Section 5. This act is effective July 1, 2006. 16 17
