Quality child care.

Sponsored by: Joint Labor, Health and Social Services Interim Committee

A BILL

for

1 AN ACT relating to child caring facilities; providing for a

2 quality child care system within the department of family

3 services; providing criteria for the rating of child caring

4 facilities, as specified; providing incentives for the

5 professional development of child caring facility staff, as

6 specified; requiring reports; granting rulemaking

7 authority; providing an appropriation; and providing for an

8 effective date.

9

10 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

11

12 **Section 1.** W.S. 14-4-201 through 14-4-206 are created

13 to read:

15 ARTICLE 2 - QUALITY CHILD CARE

2 14-4-201. Quality child care system established.

3

- 4 (a) A quality child care system is created for the
- 5 purpose of providing high quality care to children in
- 6 licensed child caring facilities consisting of:

7

8 (i) A quality rating system;

9

- 10 (ii) Incentive payments for higher levels of
- 11 quality care;

12

13 (iii) Scholarships for professional development;

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15 (iv) Technical assistance and quality support.

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- 17 (b) The quality child care system shall also provide
- 18 for a parental education and public awareness program.

- 20 (c) The department of family services is authorized
- 21 to promulgate rules and regulations for the purpose of
- 22 implementing this article. All rules and regulations shall
- 23 be promulgated in consultation with the department of
- 24 education, the department of workforce services, the

1 department of health, University of Wyoming and early

2 childhood specialists from the private sector.

3

4 (d) The state's responsibility for payments under

5 this article shall be limited to the amount of funding

6 provided for the quality child care system by the

7 legislature. The department may receive donations from

8 foundations or other private sources. Any such funds

9 received shall be deposited into a separate account and are

10 continuously appropriated to the department, which may

11 distribute those funds in accordance with the provisions of

12 this article. Services paid for by another public program

13 shall not be reimbursed under this article.

14

15 (e) Infants and preschool children served under this

16 article who qualify for disability services shall receive

17 those services through a regional developmental preschool

18 that is supported by state funding for this purpose,

19 provided the parents or caretakers agree to those services.

20 The cost of these services shall not be reimbursed by

21 payments made to providers under this article.

22

23 (f) In the delivery of services, facilities that

24 receive funds under this article shall not discriminate

- 1 against any individual on the basis of sex, color, race,
- religion, national origin, disability, or age other than 2
- the age of the qualifying child. 3

- 5 (g) Upon approval of the application for funds as
- provide in this article, the facility shall enter into a 6
- 7 contract with the state, wherein the facility shall agree:

8

- 9 (i) To provide child care services in this state
- for a minimum of one (1) year; 10

11

- 12 (ii) To provide child care services at a reduced
- 13 rate during that one (1) year period to the children of
- 14 Wyoming residents qualified under the Wyoming Medical
- Assistance and Services Act or the Child Health Insurance 15
- Program established under W.S. 35-25-101 who are seeking 16
- 17 child care which the facility is qualified to provide;

18

- 19 (iii) To submit the reports required by W.S. 14-
- 20 4-203(d) and to submit information as required in the
- 21 department's rules and regulations; and

- (iv) To immediately repay all funds provided to 23
- 24 the facility pursuant to this article, attorney fees and

1 costs incurred in collection, if the facility breaches the

2 contract during the one (1) year period.

3

(h) For purposes of this article: 4

5

"Department" means the department of family 6 (i)

services; 7

8

(ii) "Facility" means child caring facility as 9

defined in W.S. 14-4-101(a)(vi). 10

11

12 14-4-202. Quality rating system.

13

14 (a) The department shall establish by rule and

15 regulation a process for evaluating and rating the quality

16 of facilities.

17

(b) Any facility as defined in W.S. 14-4-201(g) 18

19 serving three (3) or more children, and any other facility

20 including preschools and developmental preschools, or

21 facilities that are exempt from licensing under W.S. 14-4-

22 101, but which choose voluntarily to become licensed may

23 apply to the department to be evaluated and rated.

1 (c) There shall be five (5) levels of quality. Any

2 facility meeting the requirements of W.S. 14-4-101 through

3 14-4-116 for licensing shall be deemed to be at level one

4 (1). Progression above level one (1) is voluntary. The

5 criteria to assess levels of quality shall be based upon

6 best practices as defined by rule and regulation of the

7 department and shall include but not be limited to:

8

9 (i) The learning environment, including a

10 developmentally appropriate curriculum and support for

11 positive cognitive and social development;

12

13 (ii) The establishment of child to staff ratios

14 which are applicable to various age groups of children

15 served;

16

17 (iii) Procedures and training to assure quality

18 of facility services;

19

20 (iv) Staff qualifications and education;

21 including certification or endorsement in early childhood

22 education;

1 (v) Policies and practices that encourage family 2 and community involvement in the facility's program; 3 4 (vi) Activities that parents and caretakers can 5 pursue at home which promote learning and development; and 6 7 (vii) Linkages with other community resources for the purpose of resource and referral including, but not 8 9 limited to: 10 11 (A) Programs that provide healthcare and 12 health care coverage; 13 (B) Programs that offer educational and 14 workforce training services; 15 16 17 (C) Programs that offer counseling for children and parents or caretakers of the children being 18 served under this article; 19 20 21 (D) Public health nurse infant home 22 visitation program; and 23

1 (E) Developmental preschools as defined in 2 W.S. 21-2-701. 3 4 14-4-203. Quality incentive payments. 5 consideration of the facility providing 6 (a) In quality care to children as described in this article and 7 using established best practices, the department may 8 9 provide annual quality incentive payments to the facility 10 participating voluntarily in the quality rating system and 11 achieving a rating of level two (2) or higher. The calculation of the payment for quality services shall be 12 13 based on a sliding fee scale which shall consider equally 14 the percentage of at risk children served by a provider and 15 the quality level the provider has achieved. 16 17 (b) For purposes of this section, children 18 considered at risk if they meet one (1) or more of the following criteria: 19

20

21 (i) The child has physical, social or emotional 22 disabilities or delays in development;

1 (ii) The household's income is below two hundred 2 fifty percent (250%) of the federal poverty level; 3 4 (iii) The child's primary caretaker is a single 5 parent; 6 7 (iv) The child is being raised by someone other than the parent or adoptive parent; 8 9 10 (v) At least one (1) parent of the child has 11 been convicted of a felony; 12 13 (vi) At least one (1) parent of the child has a 14 documented history of drug or alcohol abuse; 15 16 (vii) The child was born to a minor parent; 17 (viii) The mother of the 18 child failed to 19 complete high school or obtain a general educational 20 development certificate. 21 22 (c) Quality incentive payments under this section 23 shall not exceed twenty-five percent (25%) of the current 24 market rate for child care in the facility's community as

- 1 established by the market rate survey required to be
- 2 conducted by the department under the provisions of 45 CFR
- 3 98.43 of the code of federal regulations.

- 5 (d) Facilities receiving payments pursuant to this
- 6 section shall report to the department at least annually.
- 7 The report shall include evidence that the facility's
- 8 quality rating criteria have been maintained, an
- 9 itemization of how the funds were used, the results
- 10 obtained and the impact of the funds on the children and
- 11 families served by the facility.

12

13 14-4-204. Professional development incentives.

14

- 15 (a) The department by rule and regulation shall
- 16 establish incentives to encourage the staff of
- 17 participating facilities to attain certificates or degrees
- 18 in early childhood development or a related field. These
- 19 incentives may include scholarships and salary
- 20 enhancements. Payments under this section shall be
- 21 conditioned upon:

- 23 (i) The recipient of the incentive entering into
- 24 a written agreement to work for the participating facility

1 for at least one (1) year after receiving the certificate

2 or degree; and

3

4 (ii) An in-cash cost sharing contribution of at

5 least ten percent (10%) but not more than twenty-five

6 percent (25%) from the facility employing the staff member,

7 which may include financial assistance to the staff member

8 in attaining the certificate or degree, or increased wages

9 or benefits after acquiring the certificate or degree.

10

11 (b) A recipient of an incentive payment pursuant to

12 this section shall immediately repay all funds provided to

13 the recipient pursuant to this article, together with

14 attorney fees and costs incurred in collection, if the

15 recipient breaches the contract required by paragraph

16 (a)(i) of this section.

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18 14-4-205. Technical assistance and quality support.

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20 (a) Quality support payments may be made available to

21 facilities through a competitive process to provide quality

22 care for infants or other children whose care may otherwise

23 be difficult to obtain in the community. Grants shall be

24 awarded as follows:

2 (i) Repayment shall be required if the facility

3 closes the business within one (1) year after receiving the

4 grant;

5

(ii) Grant requests for increasing capacity 6

shall only be awarded to existing licensed facilities that 7

are at a quality level of three (3) or higher in the 8

quality rating system; 9

10

11 (iii) Quality support grants shall not be used

12 for capital construction or purchase of land or buildings;

13

14 (iv) Grants to any one (1) facility shall not

exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) per child. 15

16

17 (b) The department of family services shall provide

technical assistance to facilities on best practices for 18

management of child caring facilities. 19

20

21 14-4-206. Parental education and public awareness.

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23 (a) department shall develop and distribute

24 materials to:

2 (i) Promote knowledge of the quality child care

3 system;

4

5 (ii) Promote an understanding of the benefits

6 that accrue to children, families and communities from

7 quality child care programs, as based upon the latest

8 findings in research reports and studies;

9

10 (iii) Promote the advantages of parents

11 personally providing care for their own children whenever

12 possible;

13

14 (iv) Promote parent involvement in their child's

15 development and provide information and activities to

16 parents or caretakers to promote early childhood learning

17 and development at home; and

18

19 (v) Emphasize the importance of parental

20 responsibility and the involvement of the family in quality

21 early childhood development.

22

23 Section 2.

(a) The department of family services shall report 1

annually to the joint education interim committee, the 2

3 joint labor, health and social services interim committee,

4 and the joint appropriations interim committee by October

5 1. The report shall include:

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(i) The department's progress in establishing 7

the system under this act; 8

9

10 (ii) The participating child care facilities and

11 their ratings;

12

13 (iii) Information that demonstrates the impacts

of the services provided by the system on children, 14

families and communities and how the department plans to 15

16 measure these impacts;

17

(iv) Public awareness activities; 18

19

20 (v) The collaborative efforts of the departments

21 of education, family services, health, workforce services

22 and others to provide comprehensive early childhood

development and preschool experiences for children while 23

1 meeting the needs of Wyoming's workforce and economic 2 development; 3 4 (vi) System expenditures of public and private 5 funds; and 6 7 (vii) Recommendations for changes in the 8 system's operation. 9 10 Section 3. 11 12 (a) The legislature finds that: 13 (i) Nearly one-quarter of Wyoming homes are 14 headed by a single parent, most often a female, and the 15 state has the largest gender gap between wages earned by 16 women and those paid to men, resulting in more than half of 17 the young children in single female parent homes growing up 18 in poverty; 19 20 21 (ii) Participation in early childhood development programs frequently results in the earlier 22 discovery and treatment of medical and mental health 23

problems, including hearing disorders, vision problems,

- 1 learning disabilities and other problems that significantly
- 2 hinder future learning potential if not diagnosed and
- 3 treated as early as possible in a child's life;

- 5 (iii) There are approximately thirty-seven
- 6 thousand (37,000) Wyoming children under the age of nine
- 7 (9) residing in homes where all caretakers are employed
- 8 full time.

9

- 10 (iv) High quality early childhood development
- 11 programs have been shown to be particularly effective in
- 12 significantly improving the lives of children who are at
- 13 risk because of poverty, family mental health problems,
- 14 substance abuse problems or because the parent is a
- 15 teenager, a felon or is absent from the home

16

- 17 (v) The legislature further finds that extensive
- 18 research demonstrates that quality child care helps provide
- 19 a foundation for a child's success in life and, in
- 20 conjunction with other early childhood developmental
- 21 programs, results in:

1 (A) Fewer special education and other 2 publicly funded educational and social services later in 3 life; 4 5 (B) Decreased drug and alcohol abuse; 6 7 (C) Decreased child abuse and fewer contacts with the criminal justice system; 8 9 10 (D) Decreased likelihood of becoming 11 teenage parent; 12 13 (E) Decreased need for welfare benefits; 14 15 (F) Higher levels of verbal, mathematical 16 intellectual achievement in kindergarten and 17 twelfth grade and better academic performance in general throughout their lives. 18 19 20 Section 4. There is appropriated fourteen million, 21 four hundred fifty-four thousand two hundred fifty-nine 22 dollars (\$14,454,259) from the general fund to the department of family services for the purposes of this act. 23

1 Section 5.

2

(a) W.S. 14-4-201(a) and (b) created by this act is 3

4 effective immediately upon completion of all acts necessary

5 for a bill to become law as provided by Article 4, Section

8 of Wyoming Constitution. 6

(b) Except as provided in subsection (a) of this 8

section, this act is effective July 1, 2006. 9
