Real ID Act repeal.

1 A JOINT RESOLUTION requesting Congress to repeal the 2 creation of a national identification card and the 3 implementation of the Real ID Act of 2005.

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5 WHEREAS, the state of Wyoming recognizes the constitution 6 of the United States as our charter of liberty and the bill 7 of rights as affirming the fundamental and inalienable 8 rights of Americans, including privacy and freedom from 9 unreasonable searches; and

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11 WHEREAS, Wyoming has a diverse population whose 12 contributions are vital to the state's economy, culture and 13 civic character; and

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15 WHEREAS, Wyoming is proud of its tradition of protecting 16 the civil rights and liberties of all of its residents,

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1	affirming the fundamental rights of all people and
2	providing more expansive protections than are granted by
3	the United States Constitution; and
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5	WHEREAS, the state of Wyoming denounces terrorism in all
6	its forms and condemns all acts of terrorism by any entity,
7	wherever the acts occur; and
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9	WHEREAS, any new security measures to protect from
10	terrorist attacks should be carefully designed to enhance
11	public safety without infringing on the civil liberties and
12	rights of citizens; and
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14	WHEREAS, the federal REAL ID Act of 2005, Public Law
15	109-13, creates a national identification card by mandating
16	federal standards for state driver's licenses and
17	identification cards and requiring states to share their
18	motor vehicle databases; and
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20	WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act mandates the documents that states
21	must require to issue driver's licenses and requires states
22	to place uniform information on every driver's license in a
23	standard, machine readable format; and
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1 WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act prohibits federal agencies and 2 federally regulated commercial aircraft from accepting a 3 driver's license or identification card issued by a state 4 that has not fully complied with the act; and 5 WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act places a costly unfunded mandate 6 on states, with initial estimates for Wyoming of more than 7 several million dollars over five (5) years and national 8 9 estimates of than eleven billion dollars more 10 (\$11,000,000,000.00) over the next five (5) years; and 11 WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act requires the creation of a massive 12 13 public sector database containing information on every 14 American that is accessible to motor vehicle employees and law enforcement officers nationwide and that can be used to 15 gather and manage information on citizens, and this is not 16 17 the business or responsibility of government; and 18 WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act enables the creation of additional 19 20 massive private databases, combining sector both 21 transactional information and driver's license information 22 qained from scanning the machine-readable information 23 contained on every driver's license; and

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1 WHEREAS, these public and private databases are likely to 2 contain numerous errors and false information, creating 3 significant hardship for Americans attempting to verify 4 their identities in order to fly, open a bank account or 5 perform any of the numerous functions required to live in 6 the United States today; and

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WHEREAS, the federal trade commission estimates that ten 8 9 million (10,000,000) Americans are victims of identity 10 theft annually, and because identity thieves are increasingly targeting motor vehicle departments, the REAL 11 ID Act will enable the crime of identity theft by making 12 13 the personal information of all Americans, including date of birth and signature, accessible from tens of thousands 14 of locations; and 15

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17 WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act requires a driver's license to 18 contain a person's actual home address and makes no 19 exception for individuals in potential danger, such as 20 undercover law enforcement or victims of stalking or 21 criminal harassment; and

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Act 23 WHEREAS, the REAL ID contains onerous record 24 verification and retention provisions that place

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unreasonable burdens on the motor vehicle division of the 1 department of transportation and on third parties required 2 3 to verify records; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act will place enormous burdens on consumers seeking new driver's licenses such as 6 longer 7 lines, higher costs, increased document requests and a waiting period; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act will place state motor vehicle 10 staff on the front lines of immigration enforcement by 11 forcing state employees to determine federal citizenship 12 13 and immigration status, excessively burdening both foreign-14 born applicants and motor vehicle staff; and 15 Act passed without 16 WHEREAS, the REAL ID sufficient 17 deliberation by Congress and did not receive a hearing by any Congressional committee or a vote solely on its own 18 merits, despite opposition from more than six hundred (600) 19 organizations; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act eliminated a process of negotiated rulemaking initiated under the Intelligence Reform and 23

24 Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004, which had convened

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federal, state and local policymakers, privacy advocates 1 2 and industry experts to solve the problem of misuse of 3 identity documents; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the REAL ID Act provides little security benefit and leaves identification systems open to insider fraud, 6 counterfeit documentation and database failures. 7 8 9 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MEMBERS OF THE10 LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WYOMING: 11 12 Section 1. That the state of Wyoming supports the government of the United States in its campaign against 13 terrorism, while affirming the commitment of the United 14 States that the campaign not be waged at the expense of the 15 essential civil rights and liberties of the citizens of 16 17 this country. 18 Section 2. That it is the policy of the state of 19 Wyoming to oppose any portion of the REAL ID Act that 20 21 violates the rights and liberties guaranteed under the

constitutions of the state of Wyoming or the United States,

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23 including the bill of rights.

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Section 3. That the Wyoming legislature enact no 1 2 legislation nor authorize an appropriation to further the 3 passage of the REAL ID Act in Wyoming, unless such 4 appropriation is used exclusively for the purpose of 5 undertaking a comprehensive analysis of the costs of implementing the REAL ID Act or to mount a constitutional 6 7 challenge to the act by the state attorney general. 8

9 Section 4. That the Wyoming legislature urge the 10 Wyoming congressional delegation to support measures to 11 repeal the REAL ID Act.

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13 Section 5. That the Secretary of State of Wyoming transmit copies of this resolution to the President of the 14 United States, to the President of the Senate and the 15 Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United 16 17 States Congress and to the Wyoming Congressional Delegation. 18
