| 6 | Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming: |

| 8 | Section 1. W.S. 11-18-103(a)(v), (vii) and by |
| 9 | creating new paragraphs (viii) and (ix) is amended to read: |

| 11 | 11-18-103. Livestock board; powers generally. |
| 12 | |

(a) In addition to powers and duties hereinafter
 provided, the Wyoming livestock board shall:

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(v) Promulgate and enforce rules, regulations 4 5 and orders it deems necessary for the importation of domestic animals, excluding those animals covered in W.S. 6 7 23-3-301(a), recording and inspection of livestock brands, 8 inspection, testing, brucellosis vaccination or 9 quarantining of any livestock including brucellosis 10 vaccination requirements for resident cattle and cattle 11 imported into Wyoming and to develop, implement and 12 maintain a livestock health and emergency disease response 13 program, including prevention, surveillance and 14 investigation of livestock diseases through naturally occurring events or acts of agroterrorism. "Agroterrorism" 15 for the purpose of this section means an intentional 16 release of a biological or chemical agent that causes 17 18 disease to livestock or crops or renders the food products 19 of livestock or crops unsafe for human consumption;

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(vii) Designate an agency to act as its
representative as provided by W.S. 11-20-201, recorded in

1 its minutes, and transmit the name of the agency to the 2 auditor and treasurer of Wyoming; -3 4 (viii) Develop and maintain a comprehensive 5 livestock health and emergency disease response program for 6 reportable diseases as identified in W.S. 11-19-102; 7 8 (ix) Promote the prevention, surveillance, 9 investigation and elimination of diseases of concern and 10 the protection of the overall health of Wyoming livestock 11 by maintaining science based import regulations and 12 quarantines and providing instruction to the ports of 13 entry, veterinarians and law enforcement. 14 15 Section 2. 16 million 17 is appropriated dollars (a) There two 18 (\$2,000,000) from the general fund to the Wyoming livestock board as follows: 19 20 21 hundred thousand (i) Four twenty dollars (\$420,000.00) for three (3) full-time positions for field 22 23 veterinary medical officers at one hundred forty thousand

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1 dollars (\$140,000.00) each for salary and benefits. These 2 positions and to assist the state veterinarian in animal 3 trace back, risk assessment, epidemiology, affected area 4 owners, and science based decisions;

6 (ii) Three hundred thousand dollars 7 (\$300,000.00) for three (3) additional full-time positions for animal health movement enforcement officers at one 8 hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) each for salary and 9 10 benefits. These positions are to enforce animal health 11 regulations, control animal movements, instruct producers 12 on proper animal care, handling, and disposal and to train 13 Wyoming peace officers on livestock laws, rules and 14 regulations;

16 (iii) One hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) for 17 the vehicles, field office support and expenses for the 18 additional positions authorized in this act;

20 (iv) Three hundred sixty thousand dollars
21 (\$360,000.00) for salary and benefits as follows:

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1 (A) One hundred eighty thousand dollars 2 (\$180,000.00) for two (2) additional full-time positions for livestock health employees. These positions are to 3 animal quarantine, livestock movement 4 coordinate 5 permitting, training the ports of entry officers and provide input to the state veterinarian on rules 6 and 7 regulations;

9 (B) Ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000.00) 10 for one (1) additional full-time position for an 11 information technology specialist in Cheyenne to maintain 12 at least sixty (60) computers throughout the state for the 13 essential trace back and ownership for the livestock health 14 and emergency disease response program; and

15

16 (C) Ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000.00) 17 for one (1) additional full-time position for a livestock 18 health administrative staff for the Riverton office to 19 assist the assistant state veterinarian, coordinate herd 20 plans and to provide field assistance to the assistant 21 state veterinarian.

(v) Twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00)
 for the maintenance of the Riverton office to include space
 rental, utilities and maintenance;

5 (vi) Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) to initiate and maintain a Wyoming animal identification 6 7 system and health and disease trace back program including identification tags, database management and a tracking 8 9 system. The database and tracking system shall be designed 10 for a forty-eight (48) hour animal trace back of a disease 11 and to market Wyoming livestock with country of origin 12 labeling;

(vii) Seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000.00)
for training and support of programs for law enforcement
officers, livestock inspectors, private veterinarians,
auction markets, dealers, government officials and the
public for activities that benefit the food safety program
for the Wyoming public;

21 (viii) One hundred fifty thousand dollars22 (\$150,000.00) for a fully functional and integrated

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computerized Wyoming animal identification 1 system and 2 health and disease trace back program; 3 4 (ix) Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) for 5 training and support for port of entry personnel and law enforcement officers on animal identification and animal 6 7 health import requirements; 8 9 hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (x) One 10 (\$125,000.00) for research of livestock diseases or closely 11 related activities. This research shall closely coordinate 12 with livestock and wildlife disease partnership. Priority 13 shall be given to projects that have the greatest match; 14 [Staff Note: The match requirement needs to be expanded and defined. Is it a match that generates the greatest 15 amount or a percentage of matching funds from non-state 16 17 sources? Is there a limit or parameters on the research or is it open ended and wide open?] 18 19 (xi) Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) for 20 outside support from the Wyoming geologic information 21

22 science center for collaborative efforts with other states.
23 The collaborative efforts shall include work to establish

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migration patterns, calving grounds, feeding grounds,
 livestock movements and livestock market areas;

4 (xii) Two hundred forty-five thousand dollars 5 (\$245,000.00) for a livestock indemnity and emergency 6 reserve account. Spending from this account would require 7 full approval of the Governor and state veterinarian before 8 being used.

9 [Staff Note: This sounds like a new program. If so, it 10 needs more direction and should be in statute.]

12 The appropriations under subsection (a) of this (b) 13 section shall be for the period beginning with the 14 effective date of this act and ending June 30, 2010. These 15 appropriations shall only be expended for the purpose of 16 developing and maintaining a livestock health and emergency disease response program as set forth in this 17 act. 18 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, these 19 appropriations shall not be transferred or expended for any 20 other purpose and any unexpended, unobligated funds 21 from these appropriations shall remaining revert as 22 provided by law on June 30, 2010.
