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1 (a) The governor shall appoint a person as the 2 director of the state department of education from a list of three (3) names of qualified candidates submitted by the 3 state board of education, who shall serve at the pleasure 4 5 of the governor and may be removed by him as provided in W.S. 9-1-202. The director shall at minimum, 6 business, public in 7 master's degree or education administration, or other relevant advanced degree from an 8 9 accredited higher education institution, have a minimum of 10 ten (10) years of management or administrative experience 11 in education, government or business, provide credentials demonstrating exceptional accomplishment 12 in 13 employment, and provide evidence of problem solving skills, education 14 organizational skills, assessment accountability experience and knowledge of statistical 15 analysis, data management, school finance and possess 16 17 effective communication skills. 1 The department shall collect data for the state's 2 school finance system and in accordance with rule and 3 regulation of the state superintendent director, administer 4 the Wyoming education resource block grant model adopted by 5 the Wyoming legislature pursuant to W.S. 21-13-309. As used in this section, "school finance system" means all statutes 6 related to the terms and conditions under which funds from 7 Wyoming sources are made available under Wyoming law to the 8 9 public schools for school operations. The school finance system established following a 1995 Wyoming supreme court 10 11 decision, and subsequently modified and recalibrated as required under W.S. 21-13-309(t), is extremely complex and 12 13 requires timely and accurate data to be administered fairly and accurately. It is essential that a single entity be 14 established to ensure that fair and accurate administration 15 is accomplished. 16
