Apr. 18, 2014); accordingly conforming law; 6 specifying application; and providing for an effective 7 8 date.

The schools and institutions shall be billed 22 for their share pro rata of transportation and allied 23

1 charges with the receipts to be used in replenishing the 2 revolving account. If the United States department of 3 agriculture removes all commodities from this program, the 4 revolving account shall be discontinued and the balance 5 shall be transferred to the general fund;

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7 (xix) Serve as the director of the state agency 8 to accept all federal funds for aid to education, except as provided in W.S. 21-2-307 and 21-2-601, and as the agency 9 10 to administer or supervise the administration of any state 11 plan established or federal funds subject to federal 12 requirements. 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examination in grade eleven (11) shall be selected so that 1 2 following receipt of scores, students may timely register 3 for senior year classes which may be necessary to allow the 4 student to qualify for a state provided scholarship. The 5 computer adaptive college placement assessment shall be optional and all students in grade twelve (12) shall be 6 provided at least one (1) opportunity to take the 7 assessment during the school year. The director state 8 superintendent may enter into agreements with 9 an 10 administrator of the college entrance examination and the 11 computer-adaptive college placement assessment and an 12 administrator of the jobs skills assessment test and adopt 13 rules as necessary to ensure compliance with any requirements of an administrator, such as a secure 14 15 environment. Waivers may be granted for the examinations 16 and tests required by this paragraph for students with 17 disabilities in accordance with the provisions of the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 and the federal 18 19 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Alternate 20 assessments and accommodations shall be offered by the 21 director state superintendent in accordance with rule and 22 regulation;

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1 (b) The <u>director</u><u>state superintendent</u> shall designate 2 an employee of the department of education to serve as 3 liaison to the state board and the state superintendent 4 through which requests for staff assistance shall be 5 directed. 1 (e) In addition to paragraph (a)(i) of this section, 2 the director state superintendent shall promulgate rules 3 and regulations governing the administration of the Wyoming 4 education resource block grant model adopted by the Wyoming legislature as defined under W.S. 21-13-309, and governing 5 the operation of the model in determining school district 6 foundation program payments in accordance with chapter 13, 7 8 article 3 of this title and other applicable law. The 9 block grant model, as defined under W.S. 21-13-101(a)(xiv) 10 and as maintained under this subsection, shall be made 11 available for public inspection by the director state 12 superintendent in electronic format. Copies of the block grant model spreadsheets as administered under department 13 rule and regulation shall be provided to school districts 14 by the director state superintendent for district use in 15 16 district budgeting and in complying with mandatory 17 financial reporting requirements imposed under W.S. 18 21-13-307(b) and by other provisions of law. 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adoption of any recalibration of or modification to the 1 2 block grant model by the Wyoming legislature, and prior to 3 computing the foundation program amount for each school 4 district under W.S. 21-13-309(p) and determining the amount to be distributed to a district under W.S. 21-13-311 or 5 recaptured from a district subject to W.S. 21-13-102(b), 6 the director state superintendent shall certify to the 7 8 legislature that the block grant model as enacted by the 9 legislature is properly incorporated into the 10 administration of the model for the appropriate school year 11 of model application and is made available for public 12 inspection. Technical corrections to model spreadsheets 13 necessary for model administration between any session of 14 the legislature shall be implemented by the director state 15 superintendent, shall be in accordance with procedures 16 specified by rule and regulation filed with the secretary 17 of state, shall be reported to the legislature together with the associated fiscal and technical impact of the 18 19 correction, and shall be incorporated into the electronic 20 version of the model available for public inspection. The plan shall be based 15 16 upon an evaluation of the strengths and deficiencies of 17 specific indicator scores that identifies appropriate 18 improvement goals with an explanation of the measures and 19 methods chosen for improvement, the processes to be 20 implemented to deliver the improvement measures, identification of relevant timelines and benchmarks and an 21 articulation of the process for measuring success of the 22 23 methods chosen to increase performance. The director state superintendent 9 shall appoint a representative from the department in 10 accordance with paragraph (vii) of this subsection to 11 assist in drafting the improvement plan, including the 12 selection of programs and interventions to improve student 13 performance. The representative shall perform duties as required by paragraph (v) of this subsection. The plan 14 15 shall be recommended by the school district superintendent 16 and approved by the local board of trustees prior to 17 submission to the department. The plan shall describe the personnel and financial resources within the education 18 19 block model defined resource grant as by W.S. 20 21-13-101(a)(xiv) necessary for implementation of the 21 measures and methods chosen for improvement and shall 22 specify how resources shall be reallocated, if necessary, 23 to improve student performance. Failure to meet improvement

1 goals as specified in the plan for two (2) consecutive 2 years may be grounds for dismissal of the school principal; 3

4 (vii) A representative shall be appointed by the 5 director state superintendent for all schools designated under paragraphs (iv) through (vi) of this subsection to 6 serve as a liaison between the school district leadership 7 8 and the department. The representative shall be an 9 employee of the department, an employee of a Wyoming school 10 district or any combination, and may require more than one 11 individual for schools requiring substantial (1)12 intervention and support. Additionally, one (1)representative may be assigned to more than one (1) school. 13 Among other duties as may be requested by the district or 14 15 department, the representative shall review and approve 16 improvement plans submitted by schools in accordance with 17 paragraphs (iv) through (vi) of this subsection. Requested 18 resources for improvement plan implementation, or the 19 reallocation of existing resources for plan implementation, 20 shall be based upon a comprehensive review of the available 21 research. Justification for resource allocation or reallocation shall be incorporated within the 22 written 23 improvement plan. The representative shall possess
