3 model and other school finance components; codifying

4 previously uncodified law; amending related provisions;

5 repealing conflicting provisions; requiring a report;

6 requiring a study; and providing for effective dates.

8 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming:

The statewide total amount reimbursed under this section in school year 5 6 2019 2020 or 2020 2021 shall not exceed the statewide total amount reimbursed under this section in school year 7 8 2018 2019, notwithstanding any additional appropriation for 9 that purpose by the legislature. Except as otherwise 10 provided in this subsection, school district reimbursements 11 under this section shall not exceed the amount expended in school year 2018-2019, as adjusted by any external cost 12 13 adjustment under W.S. 21-13-309(o).
