## A BILL

## for

1 AN ACT relating to electrical safety and fire prevention; 2 providing authority for the chief electrical inspector to investigate electrocutions; clarifying duties of 3 the department of electrical safety and fire prevention, the 4 5 council on fire prevention and electrical safety in б buildings and the electrical board; transferring 7 rulemaking authority to the department of electrical safety 8 and fire prevention; providing definitions; providing for modification of plan review process; providing 9 for 10 amendment of plan reviews; providing for phased applications for plan reviews; amending projects requiring 11 plan reviews; providing for suspension or restriction of 12 licenses for failure to pay child support; providing for 13

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supremacy of the National Electrical Code; amending certain 1 2 fees; specifying qualifications for local inspectors; providing for reversion of enforcement authority; deleting 3 appeals process from local inspection authorities to the 4 5 department; providing for reciprocal licenses; amending 6 license fee revenue allocations; and providing for an 7 effective date. 8 9 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming: 10 11 Section 1. W.S. 35-9-131 is created to read: 12 13 35-9-131. Investigation of electrocutions; powers of 14 chief electrical inspector. 15 16 The chief electrical inspector, or his designee, (a) may investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of each 17 18 electrocution occurring in the state that was reported to the chief electrical inspector or was subject to emergency 19 response. In cases where more than one (1) agency has 20 21 investigative authority over electrocution, the all 22 agencies shall work together to fully investigate.

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(b) In performing the duties imposed by this section, 1 2 the chief electrical inspector, or his designee, may: 3 Enter and examine any property, building or 4 (i) 5 premises where any electrocution occurred; б 7 (ii) Enter any property, building or premises adjacent to that in which an electrocution occurred; 8 9 Take full control and custody of 10 (iii) the 11 buildings and premises until his examination and 12 investigations are completed; and 13 14 (iv) Take testimony under oath and cause the testimony to be reduced to writing. In taking testimony 15 and performing an investigation, the chief electrical 16 inspector or his designee may: 17 18 19 Subpoena witnesses and compel their (A) attendance before him; 20 21 22 (B) Cause to be produced papers he requires 23 in the examination; and

2 (C) Administer oaths and affirmations to3 persons appearing as witnesses before him.

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5 (c) When the examination discloses that an 6 electrocution involved criminal activity, the chief 7 electrical inspector shall transmit a copy of the testimony 8 to the district attorney for the county where the 9 electrocution occurred.

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2 (a) As used in W.S. 35-9-101 through 35-9-130:

4 "Apprentice electrician" means a person who (i) 5 insufficient qualifications to be has а journeyman electrical 6 electrician and is hired by a licensed 7 contractor to assist a licensed journeyman or master electrician. From and after March 1, 1994, An apprentice 8 9 electrician must be registered with the department of fire prevention and electrical safety and must be enrolled in a 10 11 bona fide program of training approved by the bureau of 12 apprenticeship and training, United States department of 13 labor, or present evidence directly to the board department 14 that he is enrolled in an apprentice training program which provides training equivalent to a program approved by the 15 16 bureau of apprenticeship and training, United States department of labor; 17

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19 (ii) "Apprentice technician" means a person who
20 has insufficient qualifications to be a low voltage or a
21 limited technician and is hired by a licensed electrical
22 contractor, low voltage contractor, or limited contractor
23 to assist a licensed low voltage or limited technician. An

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1 apprentice technician must be registered with the 2 department of fire prevention and electrical safety and 3 must be enrolled in a training program as approved by the 4 board\_department;

6 (xx) "Electrocution" means an event in which a
7 person is seriously injured or killed as a result of
8 transient electrical current from an electrical device or
9 installation.

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11 35-9-103. Divisions created; council and board 12 created.

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14 (c) The board consists of five (5) members appointed by the governor for six (6) year terms. At least one (1)15 16 member and no more than two (2) members shall be journeymen 17 electricians, at least one (1) and no more than two (2) 18 shall be master electricians, and at least one (1) and no more than two (2) shall be electrical contractors. No two 19 (2) members shall be employed by the same entity and serve 20 21 on the board. Any member who becomes employed by the same entity as another member during his term of office shall be 22 23 ineligible to continue as a member of the board. Vacancies

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shall be filled for the unexpired term. When new 1 2 appointments are made, the board shall select a chairman, a vice chairman and a secretary. 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7 (c) For any requested electrical inspection conducted or electrical wiring permit issued by the chief electrical 8 inspector or his deputy, a fee established by the board 9 10 department by rule shall be paid by the person or 11 contractor making the request. The electrical wiring permit fee shall be waived for anyone requesting and paying 12 for an electrical inspection. The fees established by the 13 14 board department shall not exceed the following:

(e) No person shall install electrical equipment in new construction or remodeling, if the remodeling requires a public utility to connect or disconnect and restore electrical power, of a building, mobile home or premises without obtaining an electrical wiring permit. No public

utility shall energize an electrical service for 1 an 2 electrical installation which requires an electrical wiring permit until the person responsible for the electrical 3 4 installation has obtained an electrical wiring permit. A 5 utility may energize an electrical service in an emergency situation without proof that an electrical wiring permit 6 7 has been obtained, however the utility shall notify the department of fire prevention and electrical safety of the 8 action as soon as possible, but in no case later than five 9 10 (5) days following the date that the electrical service was 11 energized. Electrical wiring permits shall be issued by the 12 chief electrical inspector upon request. Each permit shall 13 explain procedures and costs for permits and requested 14 inspections conducted by the chief electrical inspector or his deputy electrical inspectors. This subsection does not 15 16 municipalities and counties granted apply to local enforcement authority for electrical safety standards under 17 18 W.S. 35-9-121 and to exempt installations under W.S. 19 35-9-123(a)(ii) through (v).

(f) Fifty percent (50%) Sixty percent (60%) of the fees collected pursuant to subsection (c) of this section shall be deposited in a separate account for the purpose of

providing additional state electrical inspectors. Fifty
percent (50%) Forty percent (40%) of the fees collected
pursuant to subsection (c) of this section shall be
deposited in the general fund.

7

(a) The state fire marshal shall delegate complete 8 authority to municipalities and counties which apply to 9 10 enforce and interpret local or state fire, building, 11 existing building standards or electrical safety standards 12 which meet the requirements of this section. The state 13 fire marshal shall notify the governing body of the 14 municipality or county of the minimum standards and requirements of this act and W.S. 16-6-501 and 16-6-502 and 15 transfer jurisdiction and authority by letter. Nothing in 16 17 this section affects the authority of the state fire 18 marshal or chief electrical inspector regarding state owned or leased buildings. (a) On or before July 1 of each year, an electrical 8 contractor shall file with the chief electrical inspector a 9 license application in writing for each of his firms. The 10 11 applicant shall be or actively employ in a full-time 12 capacity a licensed master electrician of record who 13 assumes responsibility to ensure that the National 14 Electrical Code, W.S. 35-9-120 through 35-9-130 and applicable rules of the department of fire prevention and 15 16 electrical safety are adhered to on all electrical work undertaken by the electrical contractor in the state of 17 18 Wyoming, and who is not the master electrician of record for, or employed by, any other electrical contractor. The 19 electrical contractor shall pay the fee required by W.S. 20 35-9-129 for each firm operated by him. If the applicant 21 22 qualifies, he shall receive a license which bears the date

of issue and expires on July 1 next following the date of
 issue.

4 (b) On or before July 1 of each year, a low voltage 5 electrical contractor shall file with the chief electrical 6 inspector a license application in writing for each of his 7 firms. The applicant shall be or actively employ in a full-time capacity a licensed low voltage technician of 8 9 record who assumes responsibility to ensure that the 10 National Electrical Code, W.S. 35-9-120 through 35-9-130 11 and applicable rules of the department of fire prevention 12 and electrical safety are adhered to on all electrical work 13 undertaken by the low voltage electrical contractor in the 14 state of Wyoming, and who is not the low voltage technician of record for, or employed by, any other low voltage 15 16 electrical contractor. The low voltage electrical contractor shall pay the fee required by W.S. 35-9-129 for 17 18 each firm operated by him. The low voltage electrical 19 contractor's license fee shall be waived for any low voltage electrical contractor not employing additional low 20 voltage technicians or low voltage apprentice technicians 21 22 other than himself. If the applicant qualifies, he shall

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receive a license which bears the date of issue and expires
 on July 1 next following the date of issue.

4 (c) On or before July 1 of each year, a limited 5 electrical contractor shall file with the chief electrical 6 inspector a license application in writing for each of his 7 firms. The applicant shall be or actively employ in a full-time capacity a licensed limited technician of record 8 9 who assumes responsibility to ensure that the National 10 Electrical Code, W.S. 35-9-120 through 35-9-130 and 11 applicable rules of the department of fire prevention and 12 electrical safety are adhered to on all electrical work 13 undertaken by the limited electrical contractor in the 14 state of Wyoming, and who is not the limited technician of record for, or employed by, any other limited electrical 15 16 contractor. The limited electrical contractor shall pay the fee required by W.S. 35-9-129 for each firm operated by 17 The limited electrical contractor's license fee shall 18 him. waived for any limited electrical contractor not 19 be 20 employing additional limited technicians or limited apprentice technicians other than himself. 21 If the 22 applicant qualifies, he shall receive a license which bears

the date of issue and expires on July 1 next following the
 date of issue.

4 35-9-126. Licensing of master electricians, 5 journeymen electricians, low voltage technicians, limited 6 technicians; temporary permits; reciprocal licenses; master 7 electrician of record for only 1 electrical contractor; 8 technician of record for only 1 low voltage or limited 9 electrical contractor.

11 (a) Applicants for master electrician, journeymen 12 electrician, low voltage technician and limited technician 13 licenses shall apply to the chief electrical inspector on a 14 form furnished by the **board** department and accompanied by the required examination fee. The form shall state the 15 applicant's full name, his address, the extent of his 16 experience and other information required by the board 17 18 department. An applicant who complies with the rules of the board department, is qualified, successfully completes the 19 examination and pays the required license fee shall be 20 issued the proper license by the chief electrical inspector 21 which bears the date of issue. A master license shall 22 23 expire on July 1 in the third year following the year of

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issue. A journeyman license shall expire on January 1 in 1 2 the third year following the year of issue. A low voltage technician license shall expire on July 1 in the third year 3 following the year of issue. A limited technician license 4 5 shall expire on July 1 in the third year following the year of issue. Credit for time spent in any electrical school 6 7 shall be given to master electricians, journeyman voltage technicians or limited 8 electricians, low technicians for time spent in classes up to a total of two 9 10 (2) years, or four thousand (4,000) hours, on the work 11 experience requirements.

13 (b) Each master electrician, journeyman electrician, 14 low voltage technician or limited technician licensed under this act may renew his license by paying fifty percent 15 16 (50%) of the proper license fee to the state of Wyoming. Master and journeymen electricians shall provide proof of 17 attendance at not less than sixteen (16) hours of training 18 in the National Electric Code or in advances 19 in the electrical industry meeting criteria established by the 20 board department on or before the date his license expires. 21 At least eight (8) of the required sixteen (16) hours of 22 23 training shall specifically cover the National Electrical

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Code. An electrician or technician who applies for renewal
 of his expired license within forty-five (45) days after
 its expiration and is otherwise entitled to renewal of his
 license shall have his license renewed by paying an
 additional fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00).

7 board department shall issue (C) The temporary permits to engage in the work of a journeyman electrician, 8 9 low voltage technician or limited technician to a person 10 who applies, furnishes satisfactory evidence of experience 11 to qualify for the examination and pays the required fee. 12 Temporary permits shall continue in effect not longer than 13 one hundred fifty (150) days and may be revoked by the 14 board department at any time.

(d) The board department may issue a reciprocal 16 license to any applicant for a journeyman electrician, 17 master electrician, low voltage technician or limited 18 19 technician license if the applicant has obtained an 20 out-of-state or foreign license through an examination which is equal to or exceeds the Wyoming journeyman 21 22 electrician's, master electrician's, low voltage 23 technician's or limited technician's examination.

5 (a) An electrical contractor may employ apprentice electricians to assist a licensed journeyman or master 6 7 electrician. From and after March 1, 1994, apprentice electricians shall be enrolled in a bona fide program of 8 9 training approved by the bureau of apprenticeship and training, United States department of labor, or present 10 11 evidence directly to the **board** department that he is 12 enrolled in an apprentice training program which provides 13 training equivalent to a program approved by the bureau of 14 apprenticeship and training, United States department of labor. The board department may monitor the apprenticeship 15 16 and receive necessary progress reports. For programs determining whether a program provides 17 purposes of 18 equivalent training the **board** department shall consider and apply the current bureau of apprenticeship and training 19 standards. Apprentice electricians shall register with the 20 department of fire prevention and electrical safety and 21 22 update the registration yearly as required by the board 23 department. The electrical contractor shall notify the

chief electrical inspector in writing of the name 1 and 2 address of each apprentice electrician employed, and the date of employment or termination of employment within ten 3 4 (10) days of the action. A licensed journeyman or master 5 electrician shall supervise each apprentice electrician. A 6 licensed journeyman or master electrician shall not 7 supervise more than two (2) apprentice electricians at the 8 same time.

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10 (b) A low voltage or limited electrical contractor 11 may employ apprentice technicians to assist a licensed 12 technician. Apprentice technicians shall be enrolled in a 13 program of training as approved by the board department. 14 Apprentice technicians shall register with the department of fire prevention and electrical safety and update the 15 registration yearly as required by the board department. 16 17 The low voltage or limited electrical contractor shall 18 notify the chief electrical inspector in writing of the name and address of each apprentice technician employed, 19 and the date of employment or termination of employment 20 21 within ten (10) days of the action. A licensed technician shall supervise each apprentice technician. A licensed 22

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technician shall not supervise more than one (1) apprentice
 technician at the same time.

6 (a) The fees for licenses, work permits, examinations 7 and apprentice registrations shall be determined by the 8 board department but shall not exceed:

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10 (b) Fifty percent (50%) Sixty percent (60%) of the 11 fees collected pursuant to subsection (a) of this section 12 shall be deposited in a separate account for the purpose of 13 providing additional state electrical inspectors. Fifty 14 percent (50%) Forty percent (40%) of the fees collected 15 pursuant to subsection (a) of this section shall be 16 deposited in the general fund.
